Filsinger Named MMC Mother Jerome Scholar

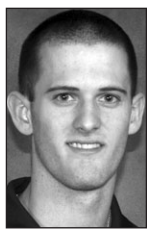

Following the intensive summer school program, Zephier will be assigned to teach on either the Rosebud or Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in the fall.

NORFOLK, Neb. — The president of Wayne State College will be the keynote speaker at the 39th Annual Commencement Ceremony at Northeast Community College in Norfolk on Saturday, May 12.

Frye will address the Class of 2012 at 10:30 a.m. in the Cox Activities Center.

Visitors approaching campus for the 10:30 a.m. ceremony can tune to 101.7 FM for parking information.

As of Thursday, May 3, some 752 students, including those earning double majors and 168 who completed their studies last December, were to be listed in the commencement program. A Touch of Brass, under the direction of Keith Krueger, will provide the musical prelude, processional, and recessional. Dr. Linda Boulton, music department chair and director of choral activities, will sing the National Anthem. She will

be accompanied by Northeast Instructor Margaret Schultz.

Asia Berg, Creighton, outgoing Student Government Association president, will give the Student Address. She will receive an associate of arts degree during the ceremony.

Anthony Beardslee, audio and recording technology instructor, will give the faculty address.

Commencement Speaker Frye was named the 12th president of Wayne State College on June 2, 2011, by the Nebraska State College System Board of Trustees. He was inaugurated at the college on Oct. 6, 2011.

Frye had retired from Wayne State College on June 30, 2009, after serving as vice president and dean of students there. He returned to serve as interim president after the 2010 resignation of former President Richard Collings. Frye began working at Wayne State in 1985, serving as associate dean of students, dean of students, and vice president and dean of students. He was also interim president from 2003-2004 after the resignation of Dr. Sheila Stearns.

Before coming to Wayne State College, Frye was a teacher and coach at Cody/Kilgore and a guidance counselor in Neligh and Wayne. A native of Elk City, he holds a bachelor of science degree in education from Midland Lutheran College in Fremont and a master of science degree in education from Chadron State College.

He has served the community of Wayne for many years as a member of the Kiwanis Club and president of the Wayne Area Economic Development Board. He and his wife, Dianne, have two children and two grandchildren.
