DAV State Convention Set For Brookings

BROOKINGS — Members of the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) from the State of South Dakota will hold their 73rd annual Department Convention in Brookings May 11-13 at the Days Inn and Convention Center, 2500 E. 6th Street.

More than 150 DAV members — including many disabled veterans of World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Persian Gulf, and even some from the current conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan — are expected to attend.

All veterans are invited to a Veterans Town Hall Meeting at 3 p.m. Friday, May 11, to question congressional delegates' staff, VA directors, VISN 23 director, and Veterans Employment representatives.

According to Harold Muilenburg, DAV Department of South Dakota commander, convention business sessions will include adoption of resolutions to be submitted to the DAV's National Convention to be held in Las Vegas Aug. 4-7.

Several of these mandates are expected to concentrate on improvements in the rights and benefits earned by some 2.1 million veterans disabled in wartime service to their country. DAV leaders are deeply concerned about this issue because many federal cost-cutting proposals would harm disabled veterans. They are particularly concerned, among several issues, with two important initiatives currently waiting for action. One would help the nation's wounded women veterans get the best care. The other supports the families of wounded veterans to allow them to provide better care for their loved ones.

Past Commanders Don Bren and Bob Hill will have a display to recognize the 60th anniversary of the Korean War. The display will be open to veterans, their families and the public.

This convention's highlight will be a banquet held at 7 p.m. Saturday, May 12, at which time the featured speakers will be DAV National 4th Jr. Vice Commander Frank Maughan of PleasantView, Utah, and DAV Auxiliary Past National Commander Sandra J. Dobreier of Grand Forks, North Dakota.

Election of new DAV state-level officers for the coming year will be held Sunday, May 13.

Now in its 92nd year, the million-member DAV is a congressionally chartered organization of veterans disabled in the time of war and armed conflict. The DAV devotes its efforts exclusively to programs designed to benefit all of America's 2.1 million disabled veterans and their families.

Legislative Research Council Seeks Applicants

PIERRE — The Executive Board of the Legislative Research Council is seeking applicants to serve on the State Investment Council, according to Board Chair Rep. Charles M. Turbiville (R-Deadwood).

The investment council is responsible for investing state revenues and determining state investment policies.

Individuals who are trained in the field of investment and finance but who are not engaged in the sale of marketable or public securities to the state may apply for this appointment. Statute requires that no more than four of the appointed members may be of the same political party. This year, the appointment may be of any political party.

Applications may be obtained from the Legislative Research Council, 500 East Capitol, Pierre, SD, 57501-5070. The deadline for applications is May 11.

Nationwide Food Drive To Be Held Saturday

On May 12, the Yankton letter carriers will be participating in a nationwide, one-day food drive. Last year NALC branches collected more than 70 million pounds of food. Yankton postal employees, along with numerous volunteers, collected about 9,900 pounds. This shattered the high total of 5,550 collected in 2003. All donations were distributed by the local food pantry.

City and rural postal customers in Yankton, Mission Hill, Gayville and Utica are asked to place the food donations by their mailbox. The letter carrier or a volunteer will pick it up.

Donations can also be brought to the post office lobby. Non-food items such as laundry soap, diapers, paper products, etc., will also be accepted.

year. More troops are expected to leave by the end of summer with all combat troops gone by the end of 2014.

The California senator said she wishes she had been able to sit down with Pakistan's leadership to discuss the need for more help from the country to break up the Haqqani network. Feinstein has previously said that legislation restricting U.S. aid to Pakistan would pass easily in the Congress.

Michigan's Rogers added that he and Feinstein agree the first step should be for the U.S. to designate the Haqqani group a terrorist network and "take aggressive steps" to disrupt their operations. The House chairman said the group is responsible for nearly 500 U.S. deaths and continues to operate outposts along the Afghan-Pakistani border.

Republicans have turned the war into a campaign issue, despite waning public support for the war, by criticizing Obama for setting an end date for U.S. combat.

"We ought to have a hard discussion about saying listen, war is when one side wins and one side loses," said Rogers. "And if we don't get to that calculation of strategic defeat of the Taliban, you're not going to get to a place where you can rest assured that you (U.S. troops) can come home and a safe haven does not reestablish itself."

the Sanford School of Medicine last June, however, remained dean on an interim basis until April 1, 2012.

Parry was a member of the medical school faculty for 35 years and also served as president of the South Dakota State Medical Association in 1998. In 2008, he was presented with the South Dakota State Medical Association Presidential Award and from 1986 to 2004, Parry served as the director of the USD Cystic Fibrosis Center.

He was also chair, Medical School Section, American Medical Association from 2007-2008. Parry received an undergraduate degree in pharmacy at South Dakota State University in 1965 and a B.S. in medicine from USD in 1967. He earned his M.D. from the University of Wisconsin in 1969.

A question remains, Parry said to the graduates in the audience Saturday morning. "What will you contribute back to society?" he asked.

He used an example from the university's department of health affairs to reflect upon that query. "The School of Medicine has a robust body donation program," Parry said. "Individuals, who are in reality our greatest teachers, share their remains so that health affairs students at the university and

students enrolled in many other programs across the state can prepare to be better healers, scientists and educators."

Parry said he and another medical school official had an opportunity several years ago to visit with many family members of the medical school's body donors.

"During these visits, wonderful stories were shared about each of the donors," he said. "We heard about hobbies, jobs, contributions to music and sports, passions and jokes, separations and reunions, occasional struggles and many successes.

"In every case, it was clear that these individuals wanted to make the world a better place for all of us," Parry said.

Parry shared a quote from the author Allen Shawn: "The planet needs athletes, philosophers, sex symbols, painters, scientists; it needs the warmhearted, the hardhearted, the coldhearted, and the weakhearted. It needs those who can devote their lives to studying how many drops of water are secreted by the salivary glands of dogs under which circumstances, and it needs those who can capture the passing impression of cherry blossoms in a fourteen-syllable poem or devote 25 pages to the dissection of a small boy's feelings as he lies in bed in the dark waiting for his mother to kiss him good night."

"Graduates of 2012, we need you," he said.
