# Hartington Police Chief No Longer On Job

HARTINGTON, Neb. — The City of Hartington is without a police chief after the departure of its top officer, according to the *Cedar County News*.  
Hartington City Clerk Crystal Lenzen and City Attorney Steve Pier confirmed that Police Chief Casey Nieman is no longer working for the city. However, the clerk and attorney wouldn't elaborate on whether Nieman resigned or was fired.  
Pier's only comment to the newspaper was, "it will all come out in a couple of days."  
The Hartington City Council met in executive session last week to "avoid unnecessarily harming someone's reputation," the *Cedar County News* reported. No details were released from the executive session, including whether Nieman's fate was decided during that meeting, the newspaper said.  
The *News* was unsuccessful in

its attempts to reach Mayor Brad Peitz, and messages left on Nieman's home phone were not returned.  
Nieman's departure leaves the Hartington police department with only one officer, Brian Phelan, who joined the force last September. Phelan moved from the Cleveland area to join the Hartington police force.  
Phelan holds an associate's degree in law enforcement from Cuyahoga Community College in Ohio and was commissioned at the Law Enforcement Academy in Ohio, according to the *News*.  
Phelan had served as an EMT and as a firefighter in Ohio. He had been working as a police officer in his home state from 2007 until joining the Hartington force last fall.  
As part of his transition from Ohio to Nebraska, Phelan will complete an additional eight weeks of training at the Nebraska Law Enforcement Academy.

Between teaching jobs in 1982, Bodenstedt said she had wanted to become a pilot in the U.S. Air Force, but there was a two-year waiting list. She then thought she could be a pilot in the Navy, but there was also a wait for that opportunity.  
One day, Bodenstedt got a call to go to the Navy's dive school. The recruiter thought Bodenstedt, who grew up on a farm near Wayne, Neb., would be up for the hard work involved with becoming a diver, including maneuvering in a 180-pound dive suit.  
Only 18 of the 32 people in Bodenstedt's class would pass it. Not only did she successfully complete the program, but she was also the only woman in her class. Bodenstedt qualified as a SCUBA, surface-supplied and mixed gas diver in 1983.  
Throughout her career, she got used to being a minority among the Navy's divers.  
"You were a minority wherever you went, whether it was a dive school or head operations officer on the ship," Bodenstedt said. "It was always a small group (of women).  
"I learned right away that, to be accepted in this male-dominated world, you had to be competent," she continued. "You had to know what you were doing. You had to do your job well. You didn't seek out shortcuts because you were a woman. I think that's why I was successful — because that's the mantra I lived by."  
In 1984, Bodenstedt would become the first woman to qualify as a submarine rescue chamber operator.  
She dived as part of many salvage operations, including the Space Shuttle Challenger in 1986, the United States Navy destroyer USS Cole in 2000, the historic USS Monitor in 2001 and various helicopter crashes.  
On Tuesday, Bodenstedt distributed an article she had written about her involvement with the Challenger recovery.  
"Most of the pieces we found

were small and indistinguishable," she wrote. "But I remember the excitement I felt when we came upon a fairly large piece which was later identified as part of the Tracking Data Relay Satellite, which was being carried in the cargo bay."  
No matter how small the debris, Bodenstedt said it was important in determining the cause of the explosion.  
"I am proud to have been a part of this historic salvage operation," she wrote.  
Bodenstedt became the first woman to command the Consolidated Divers Unit in San Diego from 1998-2000. During the last three years of her service, she was the commanding officer at Navy Munitions Command East Asia Division, where she was responsible for providing ordnance to Navy and Marine Corps units throughout the Pacific Ocean. Bodenstedt managed a \$6 billion inventory, a \$22 million budget and nearly 600 sailors, contractors, government civilians and Master Labor Contractors at eight locations throughout the Pacific and Indian oceans.  
She retired from the Navy in 2010, satisfied with her accomplishments.  
"It truly was a pinnacle," Bodenstedt stated. "The chances of getting another promotion were slim to none. I wouldn't change a thing. It was a great experience. I traveled all over the world."  
Now, she resides in Yankton where she can be close to family.  
"I always wanted a place that was here with a water view, so I ended up out at (Lewis and Clark Lake)," Bodenstedt said.  
Though retired from her profession, Bodenstedt has kept busy in Yankton as the local branch manager for the American Red Cross and vice chairman for the Yankton County Republican Party, among other things.  
"It's a matter of coming back and putting what talents you have to use," she said. "The community has been welcoming. Being a Midwesterner at heart, I knew it would be good to come back here."
