SDDOT To Begin Stanford Street Reconstruction

VERMILLION — The South Dakota Department of Transportation will be completing two phases of the Stanford Street Reconstruction project this summer beginning May 14. A brief explanation of the project follows: The project will be completed in two phases: Phase 1 will begin May 14 and is projected to end July 27. Phase 1 will include W. Main Street to Midwest Mobile Home Park. Phase 2 is projected to begin July 16 and will end approximately Oct. 5. Phase 2 will include Midwest Mobile Home Park to W. Cherry Street. The water line will be replaced from W. Main Street to W. Cherry Street. The Sanitary Sewer will also be replaced from W. Main Street to W. Cherry Street. In addition to the utility work, the road will be reconstructed to a three-lane section with an eight-foot bike trail on the west side of the street and a five-foot sidewalk on the east side of the street. The interim committees, created by the Board or by statute, will work through the summer on a study of the issues and opportunities involved surrounding the emerging oil and gas exploration in northwest South Dakota, including the opportunities and consequences regarding the current oil boom in North Dakota. Interim committees also will study the public purpose and funding of postsecondary education and water/drainage issues in northeast South Dakota. The meeting begins at 10 a.m. (CT) in Room 413 of the State Capitol and is open to the public.
