BENJAMIN HOVLAND

The American Institute of Architects (AIA) Nebraska and the College of Architecture (UNL) annually award the Bronze Medal for excellence in academic and design achievement.

The Harry F. Cunningham Bronze Medal honors the achievements of Harry Francis Cunningham, who came to Nebraska as lead architect for Bertram Grosvenor Goodhue's office during completion of the tower phase of construction for the Nebraska State Capitol following Goodhue's death in 1924. It was Goodhue's revolutionary building design which won the nationwide competition in 1920 for the creation of the state house in Lincoln. Cunningham subsequently established the first School of Architecture at the University of

Nebraska-Lincoln.

The awarding of the Bronze Medal is determined by a vote of the College of Architecture (UNL) faculty and AIA Nebraska after reviewing the Master of Architecture

student's final thesis projects. Benjamin Milo Hovland received his Undergraduate Degree in Architecture Design from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in May of 2010 and his Master of Architecture Degree from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln on May 4, 2012. Benjamin's thesis project focused on the transformation of downtown Yankton, the Meridian Bridge and Riverside Park. His thesis design will remain on display at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Benjamin is a 2006 Graduate of Yankton High School.

USDA Seeks Applications For Econ. Development Funding

WASHINGTON —The USDA is seeking applications for loans and grants to help rural businesses create jobs and spur economic development. The funding is being provided under the Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant (REDLG) program.

"Boosting access to capital sparks job creation and revitalizes the rural economy," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "USDA works in partnership with cooperatives and utilities across America, and we intend to utilize this program to leverage federal and private investments to put rural residents to

Eligible recipients are USDA rural utilities program borrowers. Those recipients pass the funds to local organizations. The funding is leveraged to create projects that retain or create jobs and upgrade public infrastructure. The maximum amount of funding for any one project is \$1 million for loans and \$300,000 for grants.

Organizations use REDLG funds to create jobs and improve services. For example, the Utilities District of Western Indiana received a REDLG loan and grant in 2011 to construct an elevated water storage tank and supply lines. The project will serve a technology park and two communities, creating nearly 400 jobs.

USDA plans to award up to \$79 million in loan and \$10 million in grants through the program. The deadline for submitting applications is the last business day of each month through Sept. 30, 2012. Applications must be submitted to the Rural Development state office where the project will be located.
