cerned about recycling and doing it the right way," Dvoracek said. "Winstead has taken it upon himself and worked with a lot of people in the community to make sure we have the right materials."

One change Winstead has implemented is the way the school recycles paper, he said. The school had always been recycling paper, but had previously been done on a homeroom basis, causing problems for the teachers, Winstead said.

Now, teachers can send Winstead an email when their recycling bins are full, and he sends a student up to collect it. The paper is then loaded on a trailer that goes to Cimpl Packing, Winstead said.

"Cimpl Packing does total recycling with everything we give them," Winstead said. "They shred the paper and use it as bedding for the livestock. When that becomes saturated they spread it on fields for fertilizer."

Perakslis said the idea of reusing paper for Cimpl Packing not only taught students about the value of recycling, but also allowed Cimpl Packing to use chemical-free bedding.

"This is such a great partnership," Perakslis said. "I love that (Winstead) was so interested and really wanted to get the students involved with it too."

Winstead has also been involved with the courtyard committee at the middle school, Dvoracek said.

"The courtyard at the middle school is something our students

have access to that Winstead made possible," Dvoracek said. "It's beautiful in the springtime with the flowers blooming."

Winstead also focused on plastic and aluminum recycling, but admits that, at first, he did not always do as much at his own home.

"We recycled our aluminum cans at home and that was about it," Winstead said. "I started reading about all of the plastic that's accumulating in the ocean and got on the band wagon about bottled water. Our water is perfectly safe to drink in the Yankton community."

Because younger students usually don't think about recycling issues, it is important to call it to their attention so it will sink in for some of them, Winstead said.

Habits are formed at the middle school age, and Winstead said that is his main motivation for promoting recycling.

Perakslis said teachers have such a monumental role in students' lives, and she loves to see teachers like Winstead take advantage of the opportunity to teach them good habits.

"(Winstead) loves his students and they respect and respond to him," Perakslis said. "He doesn't have to make this a component of his curriculum, but he does. Teachers really are the unsung heroes."

Dvoracek said Winstead will be missed at the middle school and throughout the school district.

"The students have a lot of respect for Winstead," Dvoracek said. "He's done a fabulous job of giving kids hands-on experience in many different fields."

Wheat for July delivery rose 10.25 cents to \$6.0850 a bushel; July corn rose 14.25 cents to \$5.9725 a bushel; July oats rose 1.75 cent to \$3.3025 a bushel; while July soybeans jumped 26 cents to \$14.13 a bushel.

Beef and pork futures also rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle rose 0.27 cent to \$1.1642 a pound; August feeder cattle rose 0.47 cent to \$1.5767 a pound; while June lean hogs rose 1.03 cent to 86.40 cents a pound.

Voters Elect Members For Bon Homme School Board

TYNDALL — A new face is joining the Bon Homme school board following Tuesday's very tight six-candidate race.

Winning three-year terms are incumbent Scott Weber with 236 votes, newcomer Cheryl Ludens with 216 and incumbent Dorothy Hajek with 186.

Rounding out the rest of the field are newcomers Linda K. Bares with 184, Tammy Bechtold with 145 and incumbent Jason Kokes with 117.

All of the seats are for at-large representation, according to Superintendent Bryce Knudson.

The possibility exists for a recount, Knudson said Tuesday night.

"There's only two votes (sepa-

rating candidates)," he said. "If somebody wants a recount, I'm not sure about the law on it. We will be checking on it."

Another incumbent, Teresa Sternhagen, was the lone candidate running for the one-year term, he added.

Knudson pointed to the large field running for the three open seats for three-year terms, along with Sternhagen running for the one-year term.

"I am very pleased in all who have expressed interest in the school board and are running," he told the Press & Dakotan heading into Tuesday's election.
