


cerned about recycling and doing it the right way," Dvoracek said. "Winstead has taken it upon himself and worked with a lot of people in the community to make sure we have the right materials."

One change Winstead has implemented is the way the school recycles paper, he said. The school had always been recycling paper, but had previously been done on a homeroom basis, causing problems for the teachers. Winstead said.

Now, teachers can send Winstead an email when their recycling bins are full, and he sends a student up to collect it. The paper is then loaded on a trailer that goes to Cimpl Packing, Winstead said.

"Cimpl Packing does total recycling with everything we give them," Winstead said. "They shred the paper and use it as bedding for the livestock. When that becomes saturated they spread it on fields for fertilizer."

Perakslis said the idea of reusing paper for Cimpl Packing not only taught students about the value of recycling, but also allowed Cimpl Packing to use chemical-free bedding.

"This is such a great partner-ship," Perakslis said. "I love that (Winstead) was so interested and really wanted to get the students involved with it too.'

Winstead has also been involved with the courtyard committee at the middle school, Dvoracek said.

"The courtyard at the middle school is something our students

Because younger students usually don't think about recvcling issues, it is important to call it to their attention so it will sink in for some of them, Winstead said.

Habits are formed at the middle school age, and Winstead said that is his main motivation for promoting recycling.

Perakslis said teachers have such a monumental role in students' lives, and she loves to see teachers like Winstead take advantage of the opportunity to teach them good habits.

"(Winstead) loves his students and they respect and respond to him," Perakslis said. "He doesn't have to make this a component of his curriculum, but he does. Teachers really are the unsung heroes.'

Dvoracek said Winstead will be missed at the middle school and throughout the school district.

'The students have a lot of respect for Winstead," Dvoracek said. "He's done a fabulous job of giving kids hands-on experience in many different fields.
