S.D. Civil Air Patrol Exercises Saturday In Sioux Falls Area

SIOUX FALLS — Dogs, airplanes, and high-technology will converge on the Sioux Empire Saturday as the South Dakota Wing of the Čivil Air Patrol (CAP) holds a training exercise in Sioux Falls.

The SAREX, short for "search and rescue exercise," will feature not just CAP members from across the state, but also search dogs and their trainers from the Brookings area, the use of the S.D. Air National Guard's state-of-the art Mobile Emergency Operations Center, and the wing's Cessna 172s and 182s from across South Dakota.

"The exercise is intended to provide participants with a realistic simulation environment in which to develop their mission specialty skills and accomplish evaluation of skills for completion of Emergency Services qualifications," said Lt. Col. Donald Barbalace of Aberdeen. Barbalace, a 50-year member of the CAP, will direct the SAREX as incident commander.

Shop Local Summer Rewards Program To Be Launched In May

The Yankton Area Chamber of Commerce launched the Shop Local Yankton First Campaign more than two years ago. The concept is to educate local consumers and businesses on the importance of spending locally whenever possible. By shopping local, you support the businesses that support your schools, non-profits.

A group called "KEEP IT LOCAL. L.L.C." from Winterset, Iowa, has been convincing Yankton businesses to participate in their program for the last couple years. It doesn't cost the local business anything other than the discount they offer. The Iowa company then does phone solicitations to local consumers to purchase the cards for \$39.95 (on sale from the regular price of \$49.95 and urges purchase since there is a limited supply). However, none of that purchase price comes back to Yankton.

While this does help drive consumers (at a cost) to the local business our concerns are that an outside group is making a profit off our individuals when we have discount programs available through local entities and media. If consumers are looking for discounts and coupons they can find special discounts and offers at the following Web sites:

Local stores like Bomgaars, Kopetsky's Ace Hardware and many others offer web coupons that consumers can sign up for and receive electronically. Other retailers such as Linda's Angel Crossing and Rita's Purse-o-Nalities, offer

loyalty cards that reward customers after numerous purchases. Consumers do not need to spend \$40 to receive discounts when they are readily available locally.

The Yankton Chamber is launching a Shop Local Summer Rewards program the end of May. This is truly a local program sponsored and endorsed by the Chamber. The card is printed here, distributed here and the consumer gets that card for free while at the same time has the opportunity to win Chamber Dollars. Local business will be listed under five categories and once a consumer spends a minimum of \$20 at each one of the categories, they bring their receipts and Shop Local card to the Chamber to be entered into the drawing on July 27. There will be \$600 in Chamber dollars given out as a "reward" for shopping

Within the last six months there have been several "local offers" that imply a local connection and is some cases, state that the Chamber is involved. "We have seen everything from sweepstakes winners, to city maps, magnets and travel publications being touted as Chamber endorsed projects which couldn't be further from the truth" states Carmen Schramm, Director of Chamber Services.

The Chamber wants to remind both residents and businesses to be mindful of these sale tactics. While they sound good, they may not be. 


