

USD **Society Earns Travel Award To Attend World Congress**

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota Student Chapter of the Society for Biomaterials is the recipient of a travel award for the ninth World Biomaterials Congress in Chengdu, China, June 1-5.

The USD Society for Biomaterials is one of only three institutions nationally to receive this award to attend the conference, which attracts more than 3,500 people, including some of the top researchers in the biomedical and biomaterials fields. The USD Society for Biomaterials, sponsored by Gopinath Mani, Ph.D., associate professor of biomedical engineering, received a grant of \$1,666 to send Bo Yang, a graduate student in the Biomedical Engineering (BME) Program, to the conference. Yang received both his B.S. and M.S. in Biotechnology from Jilin University and Shenyang Pharmaceutical University.

The conference theme, "Innovative Biomaterials and Crossing Frontiers in Biomaterials and Regenerative Medicine," will feature researchers from around the world who will present their materials and share information at more than 80 symposiums, forums and workshops. Dr. Shu Chien, University Pro

That's how Leo Hollingsworth described the tornado that struck his farmstead two miles north of Meckling at 9:20 p.m. Monday. Two persons were injured and extensive damage to property resulted from a tornado which struck at Lake Andes at about 7:30 p.m. Monday. The storm which hit an area about one block wide and seven blocks long, came from the southeast and moved toward the northeast.

Friday, May 22, 1987


