

growth rate in the second half of the year, however, under CBO projections. At issue is the full expiration of

two rounds of major tax cuts enacted during the Bush administration and automatic spending cuts on the Pentagon and domestic programs that are scheduled to take effect as punishment for the failure of last year's deficit "supercommittee" to produce a deficitcutting agreement last year.

Last summer's debt and budget agreement imposed almost \$1 trillion in cuts to agency budgets over the coming decade and required automatic cuts dubbed a sequester in Washington-speak — of another \$1 trillion or so over the coming decade.

The CBO study came as Capitol Hill is hopelessly gridlocked over spending and taxes in advance of the fall elections. The White House and top Democrats like Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid of Nevada say they will refuse to act on the expiring tax cuts and automatic spending cuts unless Republicans show greater flexibility on raising taxes.

"We're open to a balanced al-

ternative plan for deficit reduction," Reid told reporters. "But if we can't do that, a deal's a deal."

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Republicans are pressing to deal with the problem now. But they're not showing any more flexibility on tax increases.

You can call this a fiscal cliff. You can call it Taxmageddon as others have done," said Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah. "Whatever you call it, it will be a disaster for the middle class. And it will be a disaster for the small businesses that will be the engine of our economic recovery.

The results of the elections will have a lot to do with the ultimate solution, but several top lawmakers predict the current Congress will punt the issue into 2013 for the newly-elected Congress and whoever occupies the White House to deal with.

"CBO observes that simply extending all of our current tax and spending policies will produce unsustainable deficits and debt, which will also send the economy into decline," said Rep. Chris Van Hollen, D-Md., the top Democrat on the Budget Committee. "We need to act and we must do so in a balanced way.'

CBO is the respected nonpartisan agency of Congress that produces economic analysis and estimates of the cost of legislation.

S.D. Asst. Attorney General Arrested For DUI In Yankton

An assistant attorney general for the State of South Dakota has been disciplined after being arrested in Yankton for an alcohol infraction during the weekend.

Douglas Barnett, 40, Sioux Falls, was arrested Sunday for driving under the influence and having an open container in a motor vehicle.

While the South Dakota Attorney General's Office would not

confirm the name of the employee, a spokesperson did say that a member of the staff had been arrested in Yankton for firstoffense driving under the influence while off duty. 'There has been adverse em-

ployment action," Sara Rabern said. "It will include work suspension without pay (for 30 days), basic alcohol evaluations, treatments and/or the 24/7 program."

She said any criminal proceedings will be handled by local law enforcement.

first. Patient rooms are planned on the east wing of the hospital, said Brouwer, wrapping around the north wing and extending to where the current helicopter pad is located on the northwest corner of the building. That pad, he said, will be moved to another location.

The nine new — and two remodeled — rooms are the same number of patient rooms the hospital currently has, but they will be an updated version. There also is a new emergency room, pharmacy and expanded surgery and laboratory.

The hospital was built in 1957. and there were no upgrades until 1998, when the clinic was built. replacing the mobile trailer that had been used for that purpose. Three more outreach clinics followed in Corsica, Stickney and in Wagner in the next five years. In 2003, the clinic expanded in

Armour, along with the addition of the assisted living and a retail pharmacy.

The renovation portion of the

current project includes a new electrical system, as well as heating and cooling system, Brouwer said, along with some removal of walls and a new roof on the existing building.

The hospital's board of directors had decided that in order to continue to attract patients, said Brouwer, the renovation and addition were necessary.

In recent years, the hospital has carved a niche in the area's medical offerings with delivery of babies. During 2009, Brouwer said, the hospital had 45 births, with about the same number in 2010. That number has been credited to the outreach clinics. as well as the hospital's "quality service... at reasonable prices.

Many small area hospitals are no longer delivering babies. But Douglas County Memorial Hospital has forged ahead, recently adding a new family practice doctor with obstetrics — Dr. Morgan Merrill, who arrived in August 2011 — and joined this past February by Physician's Assistant Amber Walter.

Brouwer credits the independent hospital's board of directors with being "progressive, whose main goal is to provide quality service at a quality price.

from 32 percent in March. 'First-time homebuyers are

slowly making their way back," said Jennifer Lee, an economist at BMO Capital Markets. "That is still below the 40 percent-to-45 percent range during healthy times, but the highest in almost half a year."

The report measures completed sales. A sale typically closes a month or two after a buver signs a contract to buy a home. But a growing number of buyers in recent months have been investors who pay cash,

which speeds up the process. The number of buyers who

signed contracts to buy homes in April rose to the highest level since April 2010, when buyers could qualify for a federal homebuying tax credit.

The increase suggests sales could keep rising in May and June.

"People believe that interest rates are as low as they are going to get and that prices have hit rock bottom. So they are getting off the fence," said Tony Geraci, the owner of Century21 Homestar, a real estate firm in Cleveland.

Geraci said sales at his firm are up about 15 percent over last year. He credited that to a milder winter this year, better housing conditions and an improving economy.
