City To Appoint Interim City Manager

The Yankton City Commission will consider appointing an interim city manager Monday to serve in that capacity when Doug Russell leaves for a new position June 15.

City Finance Officer Al Viereck was last appointed as interim city manager in 2007 and is being asked to fulfill that role again. Along with his appointment, the commission will consider compensating him an extra \$1,000 per month as was done during his previous tenure.

Also Monday, the City Commission will consider a bid to re-roof Fire Station #2 because of damage related to last year's hail storm.

Other agenda items include a permanent pavement marking contract, a gravel crushing contract, final acceptance of Broadway Avenue improvements and a request by Lewis and Clark Behavioral Health for grant assistance.

The meeting gets under way at 7 p.m. in the City of Yankton Meeting Room, located at the Technical Education Center, 1200 W. 21st St.

Capitol Street To Close For Construction

Capitol Street in Yankton from Fifth St. to Sixth St. will be closed, due to construction, starting on May 29.

The contractor will be replacing the ADA ramps, cross pans and miscellaneous pavement and curb. The closure will include the Fifth St. intersection.

The newly installed areas will remain closed until the proper cure time and strength of the concrete has been obtained.
