birding activities, including presentations on listening to birds and the basics of bird identification.

Bryant said one of the more popular activities is the bird branding workshop presented at 6:30 a.m. Saturday and Sunday by ornithologist Dr. Dave Swanson.

"He has them in the hand, tells us about the species, and then he lets them go. He puts a tiny little band on their leg so that should they be encountered again, we can tell where they've been," Bryant said. "It's really fascinating to have a bird in the hand and so up close. This time of year, they're colored in brilliant colors, so they're really neat to

Bryant added that some of the activities will be held at the Karl Mundt Wildlife Refuge, and it is the only time the refuge is open to the public.

This will be a great chance for people to

walk around down there and do some birding," he said. "It's right along the Missouri River and there's a natural forest in there. It attracts a lot of different birds during this

"If people haven't been a birder but are kind of interested, this is really a good thing to come to," Bryant said. "We will have a lot of experienced and enthusiastic birders in the groups, and a lot of them want to give something back. They like nothing better than to help people identify birds, even if it's their first time, so birders of all abilities are encouraged to come.'

This year's Missouri River Cleanup begins at 8 a.m. Saturday at the Riverside Park boat ramp picnic shelter. "We calculate that over 100 tons of trash have been picked up along this section of the National Recreational River," he said. "The response has been fantastic. The citizens of this area have helped the National Park Service carry out its mission of protecting and preserving this wild and scenic river.'

Volunteers are asked to wear weather-appropriate clothing and sturdy, closed-toe shoes. Gloves can be brought or will be provided. All volunteers also will be issued official T-shirts. Participants under 18 years old must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

### **Program Announces New Income Guidelines**

PIERRE — The South Dakota Department of Health has released new income guidelines for the WIC Program effective May 1, 2013.

WIC is a special supplemental nutrition program, funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, provided at no cost to eligible moms, babies and children. Its goal is to help improve health by providing nutritious foods to supplement diets, offering education on healthy eating, nutrition and breastfeeding, and making referrals to other services.

If your family income does not exceed the following amounts for the size of your family, you could income qualify for WIC: (listed by Family Size and 185% of Federal Poverty Level): 1 — \$21,257; 2 — \$28,694; 3 - \$36,131; 4 — \$43,568; 5 — \$51,005; 6 — \$58,442; 7 — \$65,879; 8 — \$73,316; 9 — \$80,753; 10 — \$88,190


