

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota School of Health Sciences announced that four members of the faculty have been honored with 2013 faculty awards.

William Schweinle, assistant professor of physician assistant studies, is the recipient of the Outstanding Faculty Award for Research Achievement. Schweinle, Ph.D., a member of the USD School of Health Sciences faculty since 2008, received his Ph.D. in experimental psychology from the University of Texas at Arlington. His teaching interests include Statistics and Research Methodology.

Katherine Jorgensen, associate professor of nursing, was honored with the Outstanding Faculty Award for Distinguished Service. Jorgensen, a member of the nursing faculty since 1993, is part of the nursing program offered on the main university campus in Vermillion.

The department of nursing is also offered on four campuses across the state including Pierre, Rapid City, Sioux Falls and Watertown.

Dona Kennealley, associate professor of addiction studies, and Beverly Kennedy, professor of dental hygiene, are co-recipients of the Outstanding Faculty Award for Teaching Excellence. A Certified Prevention Specialist, Kennealley teaches addiction counseling courses relating to individuals, groups, and families.

Kennedy, R.D.H., M.A., a member of the faculty since 1975, received her B.S. in dental hygiene and her M.A. in education administration from USD. Her teaching interests include Dental Radiology, Medical-Dental Emergencies and Pharmacology.

- The Rev. Lawrence Larrowe’s recent Sunday fishing trip threatened to become the center of a rousing controversy over ministerial conduct. Methodist Church trustees will meet Sunday to discuss whether it is unchristian to fish on Sunday; whether Mr. Larrowe was guilty of negligence in leaving his church and engaging a supply pastor while he went fishing; and what the board should do about it.
- Five men, one of them foreman of the Sioux Falls Serum company’s farm, faced grand larceny charges after police and sheriff’s offices smashed a ring of alleged hog thieves who covered their operations with simple cleverness. Police said they discovered the hogs were hauled away and checked off the serum company’s books on “dead hog” slips available to the foreman.

- The Greater South Dakota Association (GSDA) Thursday re-affirmed its stand against a state income tax. C. Irvin Krumm, executive manager of GSDA, said in a letter to association members.

The loose-principled beatnik fad is passing, and stauncher ideals are back in style, a section of the report maintains.

Contractors’ Excise Tax Webinar Set May 22

PIERRE — A contractors’ excise tax webinar that will offer helpful state tax information will be held in May by the South Dakota Department of Revenue.

The free webinar is scheduled for Wednesday, May 22. Participants will attend the webinar from the convenience of their own home or office via telephone and computer link for audio and visual components. Participants must provide a valid email address when registering in order to receive the webinar access information.

The training will be held from 9:30 a.m.-noon (CDT). It will provide general information about who needs a contractors’ excise tax license and filing and paying taxes in South Dakota, including state sales and use tax. Owner furnished materials, special jurisdiction and qualified utility projects, spec home building, and house flipping tax obligations will also be covered.
