

Proposals For HSC Building Use Being Accepted

PIERRE — Gov. Dennis Daugaard has announced that the State of South Dakota is accepting proposals through May 31 for development and restoration of certain buildings on the old campus of the Human Services Center in Yankton.

“During the 2013 legislative session, I proposed and the Legislature approved House Bill 1033, which authorizes the state to dismantle, demolish, preserve or rehabilitate buildings on the old Human Services Center campus,” the governor said. “The majority of the buildings have been vacant for decades and are in extremely poor condition. However, I wanted to provide one final opportunity for interested parties to submit restoration plans for the show barn, dairy barn, Herreid building, Mellette building and Ordway building. If we don’t receive viable proposals, the only responsible course of action is to demolish them.”

State government is working closely with the Yankton Office of Economic Development to solicit financially sustainable proposals for the buildings that would complement economic development priorities of the City of Yankton and the State of South Dakota.

At a minimum, any proposal should adequately address the following criteria:

- Financial sustainability;
- Compatible use;
- Appropriate liability insurance;
- A performance bond; and
- Indemnity.

The State of South Dakota will work with any successful bidder regarding easement and platting issues. If no successful proposal is received, the buildings will be listed for future demolition.

Proposals should be submitted to Mike Dellinger at the Yankton Office of Economic Development, 803 East Fourth Street in Yankton, or telephone him at 605-665-9011. Requests to tour the buildings should also be directed to the Yankton Office of Economic Development.

Any ideas where can I find OEM parts or replacement interior parts at reasonable prices? —Jaime

RAY: Sure. At a junkyard. Also known these days by its society name, the “automotive recycling center.”

TOM: There are situations where a car will get in a wreck of some kind, and the car is totaled but the interior is still fine.

RAY: Or the car is sent to the junkyard for some kind of catastrophic engine failure, even though the cup holders are still working like they’re brand new.

BBB Warns Seniors Of Recent Medical Alert Phone Scam

OMAHA, Neb. — Over the past few weeks the Better Business Bureau, Inc. (BBB) has received numerous calls from consumers across its service area stating that someone had called to inform them that a medical alert device, similar to Life Alert, had been purchased for them and it will be delivered at no charge.

One senior citizen from David City, Neb., reported that she received such a call. She was told they were having trouble delivering it. The consumer told the caller that she had not ordered this product and that no one pur-

chased a medical alert for her. The caller tried to convince her that “someone bought it for you” and he needed more information on her location. Her “Caller ID” showed that the call came from 402-785-8114 in Davey, Nebraska.

BBB research on the phone number indicates the call came by Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) — a telephone call made over an IP network. The first call placed back to this Nebraska number by a BBB staff person, posing as an interested consumer, had an extended automated message explaining why a medical alert is needed.

The second call made by the BBB was answered by a person with an accent who said there was a fee of \$34.95 for the alarm necklace. When told that she would like to know more about the device, the staff person was transferred to another man who also had an accent. BBB was told that the company he represented was called “Senior Medical Alarm” which is located in “upstate New York.” When asked for the brand name of the equipment he said, “Bosch.” Upon inquiring how to spell “Bosch,” the representative became belligerent and replied, “Everyone knows how to

spell ‘Bosch,’” and hung up. “These kinds of calls are very suspicious due to the secretive nature and lack of full disclosure to their real purpose,” said BBB President and CEO Jim Hegarty. “Remember to never give out any of your personal information over the phone, regardless of what they say it’s for.”

Consumers who receive these calls regarding a medical alert system can report the call to the BBB at 800-649-6814, the BBB’s toll free Senior Line at 877-637-3334 or to your state’s Attorney General.
