MMC Women's Basketball Adds Former ELB, USF Guard Gebhart

Transferring from one school to another is rarely ever an easy decision, and Cassidy Gebhart knows all about those

sports

A former standout point guard at Elkton-Lake Benton, Gebhart eventually signed last year with the University of Sioux Falls, which was making the move to the NCAA Division II level.

Ultimately, though, Gebhart realized it wasn't the best fit. And after spending some time evaluating her options, she decided to transfer to Mount Marty College to play basketball for the Lancers.

"It was a lot harder than I thought it was going to be. It actually took me a while to figure out what I wanted to do," Gebhart said Friday, the same day MMC announced her signing

"But I really liked the (Mount Marty) coaches. I thought they would be great to

Calling her an "immediate impact kid," Mount Marty head coach Tom Schlimgen said Gebhart, a 5-foot-5 guard, is eligible to play with the Lancers next season and figures to be a key starter.

'We recruited her really hard out of high school, but she really wanted to try to play Division II," said Schlimgen, who joked that MMC was waiting with "open

"She was pretty convinced that if she didn't get a lot of time, she wanted to move on where she could play.

Gebhart played in 10 games last season, averaging 5.7 minutes per game with a total of two points scored. She and Parkston native Marie Malloy played behind starting point guard — and leading scorer

When the time came to either stay or go, it was anything but a simple decision, Gebhart said.

"I thought I'd be playing more, but it was tough not to," she said. "It was a tough decision to leave there, for sure."

Not having a chance to see the court was a far cry from what Gebhart had been used to in high school. A 3-time All-State point guard, she guided the Lady Elks to an 88-10 record in her career and three Class A State Tournament appearances including a championship in 2010.

As a senior, Gebhart averaged 20.4 points, 5.1 steals and 3.8 assists per game and led Elkton-Lake Benton to third place at the state tournament. She graduated as the school leader in points (1,567), steals (552) and assists (406).

"Her high school record speaks for itself," Schlimgen said. "She's got great quickness and spead and these just make

quickness and speed, and those just make

Not to mention a welcome addition to what Mount Marty wants to do on de-


With Gebhart on board, not to mention some of the program's other recruits, the Lancers could change their approach, Schlimgen said.

"She can really get after people fullcourt, and that fits the way we'd like to play," he said. "We'd like to have maybe more pressing, and Cassidy can cause havoc just one on one with people."

Other teams in the Great Plains Athletic Conference (GPAC) run similar defensive systems, and that type of pressure, at times, gave the Lancers problems last season. It's a welcome challenge, Gebhart
