determination to achieve their

Summing up this philosophy, he Coolidge: "Nothing in the world can take the place of persistence. Talent will not. Nothing is more common than unsuccessful men with talent. Genius will not. Unrewarded genius is almost a proverb. Education will not. The world is full of educated derelicts. Persistence and determination alone are omnipotent.'

The ability of the students to utilize this particular advice will be affected by their own personal points of view, Daugaard said.

'Don't limit yourself by your world prism. Don't put on the wrong-colored glasses and then look at the world around you," he said. "Dream big, and then have the persistence and determination to make your dreams come true, because you've got what it takes.'

The third point — to remember those who love you — was the most important, Daugaard said. To illustrate, the governor discussed his own childhood, when he grew

up on a small farm near Dell Rapids. He talked about how his parents attended each of his school functions: Christmas programs, recitals, concerts.

"That's nothing unusual probably most of you have experienced all those things," he said. "But my parents didn't come to hear me recite or hear me play in the band or sing ... parents couldn't hear at all. They were deaf. They were born deaf. Can you imagine how boring that was for them to sit an hour, sometimes two hours, to watch someone's mouth moving onstage or someone's fingers moving on the

instrument. And yet they never missed, because they loved me.

'We all want desperately to be loved and for someone to care about us and approve of us. The important moments of life are meaningful because we celebrate them with people who love us," he

That same kind of love was evidenced Saturday by the number of parents who were in the audience, Daugaard said.

"As you look forward to your new life and adventures ... don't forget to stop and remember the people who love you and who set you on this course," he said.
