P&D Introduces Google Surveys To Its Website

Online readers of the Press & Dakotan are now being asked to take a short survey to access complete versions of our news and sports stories.

Yankton Media, Inc., which owns the Yankton Daily Press & Dakotan and the Vermillion Plain Talk, has partnered with search engine giant Google to implement a survey component on the two websites.

Many newspaper websites are moving from free pages to partial and/or full paywalls to help offset a portion of the business costs associated with producing their news and advertising content in print and online.

At this time, Yankton Media is partnering with Google to test our ability to generate some new online revenue as we continue to look at the possibility of implementing a paywall, Publisher Gary Wood said.

Google works with many regional and national companies needing market research. As a partner newspaper group we receive a share of the fee companies are paying Google for each brief survey that is completed.

We began testing Google surveys on the Vermillion Plain Talk site in February and have found it works well.

When implemented on the Press & Dakotan's website, a story will show a few sentences then require the reader to answer a multiple-choice question or two to see the rest of the story. Because this is your community newspaper we're always looking for feedback on how we can improve your reading experience. Please share your thoughts with us once you've had the opportunity to experience this firsthand.

75 YEARS AGO
Saturday, May 14, 1938
The office of Sheriff Wm. J. Limpo is faced with the "mystery of safe" found in a field at the foot of a hill about 200 feet from where it had been rolled into a field from the highway in the vicinity of Irene. There are no clues as to who put the old safe there, with its doors broken open, nor are there any reports of a safe in this section of the country having been stolen.

An old Schwenk-Barth Brewing Co., beer keg of pre-prohibition days traveled far and just came to light back in New York on May 1, according to a letter received today by F. W. Schwenk, partner in the old brewing company. The letter itself tells the best story of the finding of the old keg, but its history and travels, after leaving the Yankton brewery more than twenty years ago, will probably never be known.

50 YEARS AGO
Tuesday, May 14, 1963
A train derailment on the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific railroad about 1 1/2 miles northwest of Kaylor about noon Monday resulted in considerable damage. Off the track were the last eight cars and caboose of a train going to Sioux City, Ia.
