



YC Board Of Trustees Holds Annual Meeting

The Yankton College Board of Trustees gathered in Yankton April 26-27 for their two-day annual spring board meeting held at the Summit Activities Center.

Board approval included:

• adopting the proposed 2013-14 budget;

• awarding twenty \$1,000 scholarships for the 2013-14 academic year:

 continuing scholarship assistance to the Laity Empowerment Project implemented within the South Dakota Conference of the United Church of Christ;

• and awarding a one-time \$500 grant this summer to the Yankton Children's Theatre Company to teach Yankton area youth the creative art of Vaudeville.

Looking to the future, a tour of the historic Mead Building on the Human Services Center campus, north of Yankton, was held to visualize the space available to Yankton College. Upon recommendation from the Legacy Committee and preserving a physical presence, as was affirmatively recognized by the Yankton College alumni in a 2011 survey, it was decided to execute a preliminary agreement with the Yankton County Historical Society to procure a space for Yankton College in the Mead Building.

The Alumni Advisory Board presented nominations for the Achievement, Service and Pro-Causa Awards to be given at the 2014 All-Class Reunion and an Alumni Regional Reunion in Rapid City was scheduled Saturday, Sept. 28.
