Becvar, who joined USD in 2004 as Dean of Statewide Educational Services, served in a variety of capacities integral to the university community. In 2009, she was named Dean of the Graduate School and the Division of Continuing and Distance Education. Under her direction, USD grew its graduate enrollment

while serving students more effectively. She and her staff also grew Continuing and Distance Education to an operation that

has become central to USD's mission, serving more than 3,000 off-campus and distance students each semester. In 2011, Becvar became an essential part of the Provost team, assuming the role of Senior Associate Provost and was the University's Accreditation Liaison Officer to the Higher Learning Commission.

Her work with the Crazy Horse Memorial Foundation began more than four years ago in planning what is now the Indian University of North America. This program, in collaboration with USD, has served students, especially Native American students, by offering the first semester of college for three years with a fourth year to begin in June. She will serve USD through June 21.

"Although I am proud that Laurie will assume such a critical role with an iconic South Dakota effort, USD is disappointed to see Laurie leave," stated Chuck Staben, Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at USD. "She has helped grow the curriculum and enrollment in the Division of Continuing and Distance Education and the Graduate School, and her ability to develop higher education opportunities for people beyond the classroom makes her a consummate educator. We wish her well in her new venture with the Crazy Horse Memorial Foundation."

The Honors Program teaches you to think outside the box and gives you a motivation to try new things," said Wagner of Milbank. "I had taken two years of Spanish in high school, so I was just going to test out of Spanish 101 and 102 and put it behind me. However, I decided that I wanted to be a more rounded individual so I decided to step outside of what I was used to and take German."

Wagner will depart for Germany in late summer to spend a semester at Hamburg Universities of Applied Sciences taking classes in the field of information engineering, which consists of electrical engineering and computer science. Upon completion of the academic program, he will spend an additional six months completing an internship either through the university or with a German company.

After I graduate, I would like to get my master's degree in an engineering branch of some sort, more likely mechanical or aerospace," Wagner added. # **Yankton Plant Courts Laid-Off Aberdeen Workers**

ABERDEEN — A beef processing plant in the South Dakota city of Yankton is recruiting dozens of workers laid off from their jobs at the Northern Beef Packers plant.

Representatives from the Cimpl's beef plant in Yankton conducted job interviews in Aberdeen on Tuesday and had more scheduled Wednesday, the American News reported.

Cimpl's is owned by Wisconsin-based American Foods Group, one of the larger beef processors in the nation. Jobs are available at Cimpl's and at other American Foods Group plants in the Midwest, spokeswoman Ellen Paulson said.

The Aberdeen plant announced late last month that it was laying off 108 of its 420 employees until it can raise more money for operations — a move the fledgling plant called an "unfortunate setback."

The Northern Beef plant has been processing about 200 cattle a day from the Dakotas, Nebraska, Iowa and Minnesota and has put a planned ramp up to 1,500 cattle daily on hold. It is trying to raise about \$20 million to go with the \$150 million that enabled the plant to start operating last fall after years of delays ranging from financial problems to lawsuits to flooding.

"We are here with opportunities for folks laid off in Aberdeen," Paulson said. "We are trying to find a win-win situation, where

those who are qualified for work can be matched with positions we have.

"People with those skills are in demand. They are very critical positions."

Northern Beef has said it hopes to call back laid-off workers by late July. Company officials declined comment on the recruiting by Cimpl's.

Northern Beef is familiar with worker recruiting trips, however. Plant officials made a recruiting trip to Plainview, Texas, in late January after a Cargill beef processing plant there closed. That trip did not net any workers, though, plant officials said in February.

The Aberdeen office of the state Department of Labor and Regulation was providing space for the Cimpl's job interviews.

Input Sought On Proposed Name Changes

PIERRE — The South Dakota Board on Geographic Names (SDBGN) seeks public input on new names for Negro Wool Ridge and Negro Canyon near Wind Cave in Custer County; Negro Hill and Negro Gulch near Tinton in Lawrence County; and Negro Creek near Medicine Mountain in Pennington County.

The names are considered offensive and require that new names be solicited under guidelines by the U.S. Board on Geographic Names.

The guidelines state that preferred names be descriptive of topographic forms suggested by local history, folklore, or incident, or by associated natural life or other phenomena, including American Indian or other ethnic names appropriate to the area. A proposed name should not duplicate another name in the state or nearby in an adjoin-ing state. If a personal name is proposed, it must be determined in the public interest to honor the person or family for historical or commemorative reasons, and that person must have been deceased at least five years.

The process is intended to eliminate offensive names. No name should imply discrimination or be derogatory to gender or a particular racial, ethnic or religious group, and proposed names should not be considered obscene in a present-day cultural context.
