# **Button Down' Offers Taste Of The Past**


Football! What better game is there? It's a great way to spend an afternoon, getting a game together with friends. Or watching a college football game.

But wait, we're not talking about watching a game on TV or online. This is 1929. Radio is as good as it gets. And to watch a college game in person? Well, that's just crazy talk, the kind of dream that's far out of reach.

This is 1929, and 11-year-old Ned Button loves the game. He even has his own football made out of newspapers, string, and a secret touch — a rock in the middle to make it throw further. A real football would be heavenly, but the only real football that Ned has ever touched is Lester Ward's football. Lester Ward has graduated from high

school in Goodhue, Iowa, and is going off to the university in Iowa City to play football. And just before Lester boarded the train to leave for Iowa City, he tossed his football out for some lucky boy to catch and keep. Ned can't believe it when he actually catches the ball. But just as he's cradling it to his chest, Lester's brother Burton smacks into Ned and knocks the ball out of his hands. And now Burton is claiming the ball as his own!

To make matters worse, Burton and his big friends won't let Ned and his scrawny



friends play football with them. They barely let Ned and his friends have a small corner of the lot to play their own game.

Ned shares his frustrations with Granddaddy Ike, who lives next door. Granddaddy tells Ned size doesn't matter. A good arm,

speed, and strategy are far more important than being big. Ned's not so sure. He's never even heard of strategy before. Granddaddy lays out apples in the dirt and begins drawing lines with a stick. He shows Ned how he can fake a handoff and fool Burton and his buddies, while dodging and weaving his way in for a touchdown. He shows Ned how a good throw to a strategically placed player can move the ball much faster than a runner can.

Ned sees the wisdom of Granddaddy's ideas and teaches the plays to his friends. One play is called the lke, the other the Lester. Then Ned and his friends challenge Burton's team to a game. If Ned wins he gets the football that is rightfully his. If Burton wins, Ned and his friends can't play on the lot

Granddaddy isn't done with surprises yet. He manages to produce tickets to the University of Iowa's first game in their new stadium. Ned's never been out of Goodhue before.

This is a charming book about a more simple gone-by day, where going into the city is a once-in-a-lifetime adventure and having your great-grandfather living next door to share his wisdom with you turns out to be the best gift. It's for ages 8 and up, but don't let that stop you from picking it up, no matter what your age. You'll find it's an enjoyable way to spend an afternoon — you can even break out the chips and dip.
