## Gayville Hall Celebrates Johnny Cash May 18

GAYVILLE — Gayville Hall presents "A Celebration of Johnny Cash" — starring John and Susan McNeill, Nick Schwebach, Owen DeJong and Boyd Bristow — at 8 p.m. on Saturday, May 18, in Gayville.

Gayville Hall first presented the musical tribute shortly after Cash's death in 2003, drawing the largest crowd ever at Gayville Hall, according to proprietor Doug Sharples. The show has been repeated at least once annually.

The McNeills have performed together since the 1970s and were 2012 inductees into the S.D. Country Music Hall of Fame. They have been Gayville Hall's country music hosts since 2001.

John McNeill sings Cash's vocals in the tribute and plays guitar, harmonica, and drums . His wife Susan plays bass and sings June Carter Cash's duets with the "Man in Black."

DeJong, who holds a Master's degree in violin performance, plays fiddle in the tribute, and Sioux Falls musician Bristow will appear in the show for the first time, sharing lead guitar duties with Gayville Hall veteran Schwebach.


Football! What better game is there? It's a great way to spend an afternoon, getting a game together with friends. Or watching a college football game.
