PIERRE — South Dakota Attorney General Marty Jackley is warning consumers to watch for emails that claim to be from the Walmart Corporation, but are actually scams designed to obtain personal identifying information.

A similar warning was issued Thursday by the Knox County Sheriff's Office in Nebraska.

The Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division has received many examples of these email messages from across the state. The email claims that a recent purchase from walmart.com was being processed and shipped to another address.

Construction To Begin On Summit Street

Work to reconstruct Summit Street in Yankton will begin Monday, May 20, according to the South Dakota Department of Transportation.

Crews will be removing and replacing the concrete pavement and installing a new water main on Summit Street between Ninth Street and 15th Street. Construction also includes sidewalk installation and curb-ramp replacement.

Local fraffic will be maintained to residences as much as is practical; through traffic will need to find an alternate route The work is expected to be completed by Aug. 16

The primary reasons for supporting tobacco-free parks are the health risks related to exposure to secondhand smoke, the peer influence on the community's youth through role modeling, and the environmental impact due to littering.
