Wheat for July delivery fell 4.5 cents to \$6.8325 a bushel; July corn rose 11.25 cents to \$6.5275 a bushel; July oats slipped 2.25 cents to \$3.755 a bushel; while July soybeans jumped 21 cents to \$14.485 a bushel.

June live cattle fell 0.50 cent to \$1.1940 a pound; August feeder cattle fell 1.75 cent to \$1.4337 a pound; June lean hogs fell 1.35 cent to 91.52 cents a pound.

• Assurance of five or six months steady work on the presidential shrine, Mount Rushmore national memorial, was received here yesterday in word that President Franklin D. Roosevelt had signed the interior department's appropriation bill. The bill carries an appropriation of \$50,000 for work on the mountain, 30 miles south of Rapid City, of which \$30,000 is immediately available.

• A 10-year attendance record was broken today as the Scottish Rite spring reunion resumed at the Masonic Temple.

• Three records toppled and another was almost erased here (Mitchell) Friday as five finals and several preliminaries were held in the 1963 South Dakota State High School track meet. Humbolt's Larry Stoddard came within a quarter of an inch of the Class "B" broad jump mark. Gary Hyde of Castlewood took the record away from Onida's Dick Hyde at an even 12 feet in the Class "B" pole vault finals.

said. "We found out he was a finalist for the scholarship in February, and then found out he received the scholarship in March."
Since beginning his academic career at YHS, Jacob has run cross country for four years, track for three years, been involved with the marching band, jazz band, concert band and, this year, took part in the one-act play and spring musical.
He said he is looking forward to attending UNL this fall.
"I really like the location of UNL — it's not too far from home and is one of the bigger universities in the area," Jacob said. "I also have family near Lincoln, and know the town a bit because my brother goes there."
He also added that UNL has a good biochemistry program, which is his intended major.
"I also applied to USD, and it came down to the wire on deciding between the two schools," Jacob said. "I thought UNL would be a better fit in case I decided to change my major."
Nationally, 8,300 students either will receive the National Merit Scholarship, or a corporate sponsor scholarship.
"I'm extremely thankful he got the scholarship. Not just Jake, and not just us. It's the fact that this school has provided the academic rigor for him to be able to succeed," Marc said. "With that, he invested in that rigor and did what teachers asked him to do, and it all paid off with the scholarship."
Jacob said he's thankful for the teachers he has had over the years.
"I never had a teacher here that I felt wasn't involved or supportive of their students, regardless of whether they were struggling or excelling," he said. "Teachers here are always trying to lift students up further, and I'm blessed to have had that as part of my education here. I'm thankful and really honored and glad I had the support and help on the way there from family, teachers and staff members."

Construction Set To Begin On Summit St.
Work to reconstruct Summit Street in Yankton will begin Monday, May 20, according to the South Dakota Department of Transportation.
Crews will be removing and replacing the concrete pavement and installing a new water main on Summit Street between Ninth Street and 15th Street. Construction also includes sidewalk installation and curb-ramp replacement.
Local traffic will be maintained to residences as much as is practical; through traffic will need to find an alternate route.
The work is expected to be completed by Aug. 16.
The prime contractor on the \$1.8 million project is Masonry Components of Yankton.

EMS Week To Be Celebrated In Yankton
Yankton County EMS will be celebrating EMS Week this year May 19-25 with the theme of "One Mission. One Team." Local EMS personnel have several events planned in conjunction with the week.
May 22 is EMS Day for Children. EMS personnel are giving away life jackets for the kids who attend the event, as well as having boating and water safety as well as games and prizes to be given away. The event is primarily for children ages 1-17 and will take place at 4-8 p.m. Wednesday at the EMS building at 805 Capitol.
At the event, Yankton Search and Rescue members will be on hand showing their dive equipment, boats and so on, and they will be providing the proper fitting of life jackets to the kids. Larry Hingen will be on hand from the USCG to discuss water and boating safety. John Rokosz from the National Parks Service will have a canoe and equipment present to discuss canoe safety. Karla Zeutenhorst from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will be available with games and prizes, as well as water safety information. There will also be hot dogs and drinks available.
On Thursday, May 23, there will be an automated external defibrillator (AED) clinic at the station from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Area businesses that have AEDs, either in their store or place on employment, were sent letters stating that local personnel will check their AEDs for free to make sure they are in correct working order. First aid supplies will also be available.
