Humane Society Begins TNR Project Today

VERMILLION — On Wednesday, May 22, members of Heartland Humane Society will team up with Cedar County Veterinary Services and the City of Vermillion to perform the humane society's first TNR project. To stabilize and ultimately reduce the feral cat population, many animal and governmental organizations are turning to trap, neuter and return (TNR), a method of managing cat colonies that involves trapping the animals, spaying or neutering them, vaccinating, and returning them to where they were found. The project is being made possible with a grant from the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA.) "We are very excited to perform this TNR clinic and we've had wonderful support from Cedar County Vet and the city of Vermillion," Kerry Schmidt, Executive Director of Heartland Humane Society, said. "Studies have shown that such clinics like this one can reduce the cat population by as much as 60 percent over time." A project goal of 50 cats has been set. Letters went out to area residents in the targeted Duke Street area earlier this month. Schmidt said the humane society is fully aware of the concern for an overpopulation of cats in the Vermillion area. "The concern for feral cats in Vermillion has always been on our radar since we began in 2006," she said. "We hope this project warrants enough success to continue applying for TNR grants and work with all local governments and vets to keep the feral cat population healthy and safe."

Kayak Challenge Will Impact Park Availability

The South Dakota Kayak Challenge will be using green space in Riverside Park on Friday, May 24, and the morning of Saturday, May 25, to store kayaks overnight, have race participants camping in the park, and staging for the race to begin on Saturday morning at 7 a.m. Note that the green space to the south of the Capitol Building will be fenced off to allow for the kayaks to be stored in a safe and monitored environment the night of May 24. Approximately 150 racers will be participating in the 2013 Kayak Challenge and a majority of those will be camping in the park that evening.

Fish Hatchery Open House Slated For Saturday

The Gavins Point National Fish Hatchery, located 3 miles west of Yankton on Highway 52, will be hosting an open house event with tours of the hatchery on Saturday, May 25, from 1-4 p.m. Hot dogs and bottled water will be served. Friends Group membership opportunities will be available.

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Local Programs Celebrating National Drug Court Month

PIERRE — South Dakota Drug Courts, in conjunction with Drug Courts across the nation, are joining together to celebrate National Drug Court Month. During the month of May, the impact Drug Courts and DUI Courts have on both the individual participants and South Dakota's communities as a whole will be highlighted. Drug Court programs are a proven method of combating addiction for individuals, reducing prison populations, reintegrating participants into the workforce and allowing those individuals to maintain family relationships. The successful implementation of a Drug Court program requires the collaboration of judges, prosecutors, defense counsel, treatment professionals, court service officers, and law enforcement officials. Working together, they can best determine how the judicial process can be used most effectively to aid addicted offenders in order to keep them from coming back into the criminal justice system. During the month of May, Drug Courts across the Nation pause to recognize the accomplishments of Drug Courts and the individuals they serve. Currently, there are five Drug Courts operating in South Dakota. This includes Drug Courts in Sioux Falls, Yankton, Sturgis/Rapid City and DUI Courts in Aberdeen and Pierre/Ft. Pierre. This fall three additional courts will join the five current courts, Mitchell (Drug), Rapid City (DUI) and Sioux Falls (DUI). Participants and Team members of the Yankton Drug Court Team kicked off National Drug Court month by participating in a community wide cleanup. The Brown County DUI/Sobriety Court, located in Aberdeen, hosted an informational meeting for attorneys to learn more about the DUI Court program.
