## Senior Defends Title In Leading Pierre To First Girls' Golf Crown

One year after coming up just short of the ultimate sweep, the Pierre Lady Governors flipped the

Their reward? The school's first-ever state girls' golf title.

Pierre rallied from a 5-shot deficit after Monday's first round to catch — and pass — three-time defending champion Sioux Falls O'-Gorman by three strokes for the team championship at the S.D. State AA Girls' Golf Tournament on Tuesday at Hillcrest Golf & Country Club in Yankton.

It made for some sweet revenge, said a smiling Pierre head coach John Knox.

"It was close; a little too close for comfort," he said. "It's kind of good, because last year we had the lead and they came back and beat

"This year we switched the thing. It worked out good; we're very happy.

Pierre, last year's runner-up to O'Gorman, edged the Knights 691-694 for first place. Yankton, at 726, finished third on its home course, followed in the top five by Sioux Falls Lincoln (748) and Rapid City Stevens (749).

Not only did the Lady Gover-nors get to celebrate on a rainy and cool afternoon, they got to watch their senior Hallie Getz walk away with her second consecutive individual title.

Getz, a South Dakota State re-cruit, carded a 77 on Tuesday for a 2-day score of 153. She finished eight strokes ahead of Lincoln's Abbie Grevlos and Yankton's Megan Mingo — Grevlos beat Mingo in a 1-

hole playoff for second place.
By turning a 4-shot lead after
the first round in an 8-shot finish Tuesday essentially eliminated any drama from the individual race.

'That's what I said too, but my dad said, 'No, the pressure's not on you, it's on them because none of them have won a state championship," Getz said. "And luckily it

ended up working out well."

Part of that was due to her mentality, Getz said.

"I came in (Tuesday) thinking that I was even with them and not let myself focus on having a big lead," she said. Getz birdied No. 10 and was never really threatened

The Lady Governors were aided by a pair of other top-10 finishes and another golfer at 23rd. Karissa Guthrie took 10th place at 175, followed by Katie Bartlett at 176. Paige Lonbaken finished 23rd at 190, while the duo of Tatum Richards (193) and Jenna Johnson (194) were 27 and 28th, respec-

Not bad for a program that is still without a home golf course, Knox said.

'We've been practicing on soccer fields and inside golf sheds with the nets up, but that's the way it is," he said. "They're hard workers, and next year it'll be better because it'll (state) be at our place.

He later added, "They've been through a lot the last couple years." As has Getz.

Calling his lone senior a "bulldog," Knox recalled instances where Pierre would return from various meets or tournaments and Getz would soon head out to the driving range.

Her hard work was capped off in style, with yet another champi-

"It's definitely a good end to my senior year, and I'm just so proud of my team," she said.

The only senior among the lead group on Tuesday was Lincoln's Grevlos, who surged to an 80 after the first round. She followed that up with an 81 in the second round.

"It took me a while to get my drives down; the first eight holes were rough," Grevlos said. "But once I figured that out, it helped me

Even despite hitting her tee shot on the 17th hole into the water, she was able to keep pace with Mingo. Plus, Grevlos was able to play with Pieper, whom she called a good

"That was pretty nice to play with Haliee," Grevlos said. "And now I have one more try at that thing (title)."

Pieper, meanwhile, carded an 83 on Tuesday to finish at 164 in what was her final high school action.

"I tried to stay level-headed and not think about the way things were going hole by hole," Pieper said. "I just tried to hit fairways and greens; keep it simple.

For her, the focus now turns to her collegiate career at Boise State University.

"It was a little bittersweet." Pieper said. "I'm really going to miss my teammates and coaches, but I'm excited to move on and play


MILBANK — The final round of the S.D. State Class A Girls' Golf Tournament was called off Tuesday because of weather, so Monday's scores held up.
