VERMILLION — Joining a program looking to turn a corner is one kind of challenge. Than there's the situation facing Nick Mayer.

How about joining a team that went 24-1 and won a state championship?

Mayer, 32, is leaving his position as head girls' basketball coach at Vermillion High School to take the same position at Harrisburg, which will join the Class AA ranks and join the Eastern South Dakota Conference (ESD) next season.

"It's a very unique challenge, that's for sure," Mayer said Thursday. "And now being moved up to the highest level in our state, it'll be fun.'

Harrisburg, though, rise to the highest level of its class last season under former coach Marcus Leloux. The Tigers were unbeaten against Class A competition and rolled to the state title — all in their first-

ever state tournament appearance. Mayer, who went 41-48 in four seasons as Vermillion head coach after being promoted from assistant in 2009, said family logistics attracted him to the position in Harrisburg. His wife commutes to and from her job in Sioux Falls.

"I knew there was going to be an opening there for a while, but I didn't want to think about it much during our season," said Mayer, who has a young daughter. "But it's one of those great opportunities for our

A Vermillion native and 2004 University of South Dakota graduate, Mayer has spent his entire teaching and coaching career in that district. He finished his eighth year as a teacher this spring and spent seven seasons in all with the Vermillion girls' basketball pro-

He was an assistant under former coach Jamie Parish for three seasons, including Vermillion's Class A title run in 2007. Mayer assumed the head coaching position in 2009 and later led the Tanagers to the 2012 state tournament — finishing eighth.

His team last season went 10-11 and lost in the first round of the district tournament.

"I'm sad to leave Vermillion, because that's been our home for a long time," Mayer said. "I get

choked up even talking about it. I've been privileged to work with such great people and great kids.

On the issue of Vermillion's next coach, Mayer said he has two "fantastic" assistants, in J.J. Heyden (a 2007 Mount Marty College graduate) and Mallory Schmidt.

Each of them could do a great job, if that's the route the district goes," Mayer said. "Ultimately, I know they'll make a good decision and hire the right person."

In his next stop, Mayer will inherit a Harrisburg program that will join Yankton, Brandon Valley, Sioux Falls Lincoln and Sioux Falls Washington in District 2AA next season.

"It'll be interesting to come to Yankton for a game instead of a team camp, plus it'll be nice to play in the Summit," Mayer said.

Travel, of course, will present a new challenge for Mayer. While in Vermillion, the longest road trip for his teams was to Madison, where as he will now travel to places like Pierre and Aberdeen in the ESD.

The prospect of matching up with Sioux Falls schools is some-

The Yankton Bucks and Gazelles bring a fairly young contingent to the South Dakota State Class AA Track and Field Meet, today (Friday) in Brandon and Saturday in Sioux Falls, but Coach Luke Youmans still expects a strong effort on the final weekend of the sea-

Yankton takes 20 girls and 16 boys to the meet this weekend, with several expected to score points in the meet that caps a tough season to compete in an outdoor sport.

"It's been tough on the kids, tough on everybody. The kids haven't been as excited about track as they usually are," he said. "But we've managed to keep everyone healthy that we really need to keep

The Bucks are without entries in the 200, 400 and 800, as well as both hurdle races, but Youmans is hoping to see the squad advance its relays to Saturday's finals.

"We have a young crew, especially when you look at the sprint relays," he said. "Our goal is to have as many running on the second day as possible. Our seniors have to to step it up on our sprint

Yankton has the potential to ior J.J. Hejna. The multi-sport standout ranks second in the triple jump, third in the high jump and fifth in the long jump. He will also compete on the Bucks' 1600 relay

"J.J.'s been there, and he's had some success," Youmans said. "He's a wild card coming in, because he's continued to get better. If he gets a little better, he could surprise a lot of people.

The Bucks also have two athletes ranked in the top 10 in the pole vault, senior James Hofer and junior Casey Skillingstad. Besides Heina, the Bucks also have sophomore Lee Rose ranked eighth and junior Richard Culver qualified in the long jump, and sophomore Matt Fitzgerald qualified in the high jump.

Beresford

The Watchdogs boast a combined eight individual entries and one relay headed to state.

The Beresford girls have the potential to score in the throws, led by seniors Ashley Ostrem and Hannah McKelvev. Ostrem. who placed seventh in the discus a year ago, ranks second in the discus and just outside the top eight in the shot put, while McKelvey, fifth at state in the shot put a year ago, ranks fifth in that event.

Also for the Watchdog girls, Alyson Johnsen, a Sioux Falls basketball recruit, is entered in the

For the boys, senior Dalton Jones is entered in both the 100 and 200, ranking seventh in the 100. Senior Nick Antonson is entered in the 110 hurdles, while junior Riley Schaap is entered in the 1600. The Watchdogs also are entered in the 3200 relay.

Bon Homme

The Cavaliers will take a full bus to Lennox and Sioux Falls, with 20 athletes, 14 individual events and seven relays.
