Two individuals, different by nature yet UNITED by a local mentoring program, Big Friend - Little

Big Friend - Little Friend (BFLF), a United Way Partner Agency, is designed to give a young person (Little Friend) the opportunity to gain the friendship and example of a sincere adult (Big Friend).

BFLF matches adult volunteers with young people within our community. The one-to-one relationship that develops between the Big Friend volunteer and the Little Friend both enriches the life of the young person and supplements the family structure.

The purpose of this program is not to reduce the family but rather to offer a special strength to it, by providing the Little Friend with a positive role model outside the family atmosphere.

Joey, whose mother enrolled him in the BFLF program to gain self-esteem and confidence, was paired with Mount Marty student, Luis. Luis enrolled as a Big Friend, wanting to mentor and help children succeed in school and in life.

Joey and Luis meet every Monday and Wednesday after school to work on homework, play educational games or just talk about their day and giggle.
"One day, Joey came in a little

bit down", says Luis. "He told me he was just having a long day. We proceeded to work on homework and by the end of our mentoring session, I got Joey to cheer up, and

he walked out with a smile. On that day I realized I really mean something to this kid."

At its most basic level, mentoring guarantees a young person that there is someone who cares about them. A child is not alone in dealing with day-to-day worries.

to study for a test or make plans for college? Do you remember wanting your first car or looking for a part-time job? Simple things that seem easy or straightforward to you now may appear to be a complete mystery to a young per-

Research confirms that mentoring works. A Research Brief published by Child Trends and titled "Mentoring: A Promising Strategy for Youth Development" found that

youth who participate in mentor-

ing relationships experience a number of positive benefits. • In terms of educational achievement, mentored youth have better attendance; a better chance of going on to higher edu-cation; and better attitudes toward

school. • In terms of health and safety, mentoring appears to help prevent substance abuse and reduce some negative youth behaviors.

• On the social and emotional development front, taking part in mentoring promotes positive social attitudes and relationships. Mentored youth tend to trust their parents more and communicate better with them.

According to BFLF Program Director, Stacy Starzl, Joey and Luis are a great example of how mentoring works. "They became fast friends. Joey's smile is beaming when he comes to meet Luis. He is always very excited about what they are going to do, even if it is homework. I have seen his confidence grow over these last few months. It is amazing how one person can make such a difference in the life of another."
