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Coyotes To Put Sights On Oregon In 2014 Season

Football: \$525K Payday For Game Will Be USD's Highest To Date

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In the land of Nike's 'Just Do It' campaign, the University of South Dakota football program will see next fall if it can do what not many have done: Beat a perennial title contender on its home

The Coyotes announced Friday that it will play the University of Oregon on Aug. 30, 2014 in Eugene. The seventh such FBS guarantee game for USD in five seasons will net the visitors a payday of \$525,000, athletic director David Herb-

"They're definitely one the premier programs in the country, and it certainly gets us into an area we wouldn't normally have exposure in," Herbster said. "For our players and our program, it gives you a chance to compete in a topnotch environment like that."

Oregon, a member of the Pac-12 Conference, was 12-1 last season and beat Kansas State in the Fiesta Bowl. The Ducks were ranked No. 2 in the final Associated Press poll — success that ultimately lured head coach Chip Kelly to

The Coyotes, meanwhile, are coming off a 1-10 season last fall, the first for head coach Joe Glenn.

The addition of Oregon to USD's future schedules means the Coyotes now have FBS games locked up for the next

three seasons. USD will face Kansas in September, the Ducks in 2014 and Kansas State in 2015.

"We're always in the hunt for games, but it comes down to two sides who need a game and when," Herbster said.

The conversations between the two schools began last fall with previous USD athletic director David Sayler, and was later passed on to Herbster. USD and Oregon officials went back and forth on the contract amount was later set earlier this year, Herbster said.

The \$525,000 check USD will receive is by far the highest payday from an FBS school over its previous six matchups. By comparison, USD will receive between \$420,000-\$425,000 for its game

Sept. 7 at Kansas — about the same amount the Coyotes garnered for its eventual win at Minnesota in 2010.

USD could have waited to schedule an FBS opponent for 2014, but there are risks involved, Herbster said.

"The longer you wait, you run the risk of not finding someone, or someone that is really desperate," he said. "Those are going to your Alabamas or LSUs.

"But we looked at it from the standpoint of, let's not wait, we have a situation that benefits our student-athletes, let's go ahead and do it."

That mutual benefit was important, Glenn said in Friday's release.

"It will be an experience that our players will be able to share with their children and grandchildren," he said. "Financially, it helps out our department and helps make ends meet." Did Glenn sound anxious for the chal-

'Is he excited about it? No. But I wouldn't be either," Herbster said, jokingly. "But he understands it's an oppor-

tunity for the student-athletes to participate in something like this.' Herbster alluded to Glenn's upset of Tennessee in 2008 (when he was coaching at Wyoming) and USD's upset of Min-

nesota in 2010 as proof that yes, anything can happen. "You're going to take your lumps, but at the end of the day, you have to take

Race To The Finish Begins

B: Parker Leads, Cougars In The Hunt

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SIOUX FALLS — Duane Jongeling saved perhaps his widest smile and most intense celebration for his final individual distance race.

And his performance helped Parker to the Class B boys' team lead by 3.5 points after day one Friday at the South Dakota State Track Meet at Howard Wood Field in Sioux Falls.

Jongeling, a senior, won the boys' 3200meter run in a time of 9:48.34, finally edging his rival Jase Kraft of Wessington Springs. Kraft, a junior, had beaten Jongeling in the 3200 each of the previous three years. This year, Jongeling flipped the script.

"This one felt really good," he said. "Being able to hold off Jase for once was my goal. It's always been him and then me in the 2-mile the last three years.

Jongeling, a South Dakota State recruit, celebrated in his usual style. He waved at the Howard Wood crowd as he approached the finish line and later kissed the track.

Earlier the day, Parker's distance group won the 3200-meter relay in a time of 8:29.26. The Pheasants also got points from junior Michael Olson, who took third in the 800. Tristen Erickson (fifth) and Zack Anderson

(tied-seventh) added to Parker's day one total with their performances in the high jump. Parker leads Herreid-Selby Area 33.5-30 in the team race, followed by defending cham-

pion Viborg-Hurley (17). "I'm actually surprised we're in the lead right now, but I think we'll still do OK," Jongeling said. "We don't have field events and sprints like the other teams do, but third or

fourth is possible." Viborg-Hurley, meanwhile, is looking to re-

peat last year's championship performance. The Cougars were led Friday by senior Tyler Gerdes, who won the long jump (21-feet-2) and later took fourth in the triple jump (40-6.25).

My goal was to win both, but I loved winning the long jump twice in a row. I'll take that," Gerdes said. "It was nice to have Shaun Becker (of Freeman) finish second. We're best friends."

Viborg-Hurley also advanced Trevor Jacobsen and Tyler Novak to the finals of the 100and 200-meter dashes. The Cougars also moved on to the finals of the 400 and 800 re-


lays — both with the top time. "Trevor and Tyler should do pretty well in the sprints, and our relays are looking great," Gerdes said. "I'm feeling good about where we

"It's going to be close, though, just like last

Irene-Wakonda, last year's runner-up sits in sixth place after day one with 14.5 points.

Senior Dustin Livingston accounted for eight of those points Friday with his secondplace finish in the pole vault at 12-6. He tied Cooper Schaefbauer of Herreid-Selby Area but had more misses.

"It's bittersweet, but it's still really good," said Livingston, who has finished second in the pole vault three straight years. "It's kind of

On a day where the only thing that disrupted the Bucks and Gazelles was the weather, they did just that.

Yankton snuck several finalists and places where the pre-meet seeds said it shouldn't, giving the young YHS squad optimism going into today's (Saturday) final session at Sioux Falls' Howard Wood

"Especially at the beginning of the meet, we started off pretty hot," Youmans said. "Through the course of the day, we had some good, some bad."
