

SDSU Leaders Visit Area Thursday

BROOKINGS — Leadership from South Dakota State University continues their “On the Road 2013” tour on Thursday, May 30, with stops in Salem, Madison, Mitchell, Wagner, Freeman and Yankton.

SDSU President David Chicoine, Provost Laurie Nichols, and representatives of the SDSU Foundation and SDSU Alumni Association will visit with local officials and members of the communities to share details of the university’s new strategic plan, IMPACT 2018, and what that will mean for them and other South Dakotans.

“It was beneficial to get out and talk with stakeholders in the northeastern part of the state last week,” said Chicoine. “We look forward to continuing those meetings. The strategic planning work last spring included listening sessions with constituents in several communities around South Dakota. This tour gives us the chance to report back to

them about the direction of the university.”

The SDSU contingent will divide into a yellow group and blue group, led by the president and provost respectively, for morning stops in Salem and Madison. They will come together in Mitchell for a lunch event hosted by President Chicoine and Provost Nichols at the Mitchell Technical Institute.

They’ll split again into blue and yellow groups for mid-afternoon visits to Wagner and Freeman, then reconvene in Yankton for an evening reception hosted by First Dakota National Bank.

The morning stops in Salem and Madison are open to the public and will offer coffee and conversation. The afternoon visits to Wagner and Freeman, also public events, will feature samples of SDSU’s famous Dairy Bar ice cream. A complete schedule appears below.

One Book South Dakota author Danielle Sosin will appear at the Yankton Community Library, 515 Walnut Street, at 6:30 p.m. Monday, June 24, as a part of her summer-long book tour. Members of the public are invited to attend this free event.

Sosin, whose novel “The Long-Shining Waters,” is the 2013 One Book South Dakota, is making four week-long tours throughout the state prior to her appearance at the South Dakota Festival of Books in Deadwood September 20-22. The Duluth, Minn., resident and past Festival of Books presenter is traveling to one region of the state each month.

In “The Long-Shining Waters,” Sosin weaves an intricate tale revolving around Lake Superior. At each tour stop, Sosin will discuss various themes related to her novel, answer readers’ questions and sign books. The novel’s content provides numerous opportunities for

discussion of the 2013 SDHC programming theme of water, along with many other issues.

During the months of May and June, patrons can register for book giveaways when checking out at the circulation desk. Twenty copies of “The Long-Shining Waters” have been provided by the South Dakota Humanities Council and the South Dakota Center for the Book as a way to promote Sosin’s tour.

Books are also available for check out at the Yankton Community Library. Both book clubs and individuals are encouraged to read the book and attend Sosin’s appearance as well as the library’s discussion lead by Jamie Sullivan, a member of the South Dakota Humanities Speaker’s Bureau, which is scheduled for Oct. 10.
