

"I thought it was a good public service interview show and a good tradition," he stated. "I was extremely pleased that they even improved it by adding more segments and the noon rebroadcast."

Curt Dykstra, general manager of KYNT, called the 25th anniversary of "Morning Coffee" a big occasion for the station.

"It's very rare that you find programs that have been around that long and get handed down to other people," he said.

"This program isn't just for the people of Yankton. There are people who commute here, and it relates to them, too. Things that happen in the community impact their lives, as well."

Dykstra said he was grateful when Kooistra returned to the station in 2011.

"It's always been a good program, but he brings a new dimension," he stated. "I'm so thankful to have him around, and the community is thankful. The community appreciates him and the program."

Kooistra estimates that 50 percent of the approximately 1,500 segments a year feature guests who request to be on the show. Dykstra said it is proof that people believe "Morning Coffee" is an important way to reach community members.

According to Kooistra, the

show has provided him with many interesting memories.

"I've interviewed the tallest man in the world at 8-foot, 3-inches," Kooistra said. "He had to duck to get into the studio. I rode around in his vehicle, and you should have seen how far back his seat was! It was custom made."

One pregnant guest had contractions on air and delivered her baby within 24 hours. Another guest was traveling around the world with his donkey.

"My favorite interviews are for topics I don't know anything about," Kooistra said. "I think those are the best interviews because I think I ask the best questions. If it's a topic I feel knowledgeable about ... I'll tend to find myself asking and answering the question at the same time. Where does the person you're interviewing go with that?"

The program is one of Kooistra's proudest achievements as a broadcaster.

"One of the things I've really liked about the show is that it is 100 percent local. It's Yankton or Yankton-area people, newsmakers, events and issues," he said. "It's one of the things that makes me want to get up at 4 a.m. every day and come in. I always look forward to the interviews and having people in."

Man With Yankton Connection Fatally Shot By Colorado Police

A man arrested in Yankton several years ago was fatally shot by police earlier this week in Salida, Colo.

According to *The Mountain Mail* in Salida, Theodore Dennis Vanosdall, 36, was shot Sunday evening after firing multiple rounds at police officers.

Vanosdall was cutting through the front door of an acquaintance's home with a chainsaw in an attempt to enter the residence. The acquaintance fled through a back door, and law enforcement responded to the scene.

Multiple shots were fired through the front windows of the home by Vanosdall, and officers had to take shelter because they could not see him. A Salida police officer and a Chaffee County Sheriff's deputy went to the back of the house where they spotted Vanosdall attempting to flee.

The officers ordered Vanosdall to drop what turned out to be a stolen 9mm semi-automatic handgun, but he instead fired at them. Law enforcement returned fire, and Vanosdall was fatally wounded. No officers were injured.

Vanosdall was on parole from South Dakota with multiple drug, weapon and theft convictions. He had been living in Salida for about a year.

On May 18, 2009, the *Press & Dakotan* reported that Vanosdall, then 32, was arrested on a probation violation. It is unclear if he was living in Yankton at the time.

On Facebook, Vanosdall listed his hometown as Ainsworth, Neb.

USDA Proposes Simplified Application Process For Renewable Energy Funding

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Department of Agriculture has proposed a series of changes to make it easier for agricultural producers and rural small businesses to apply for renewable energy and energy efficiency funding. USDA remains focused on carrying out its mission, despite a time of significant budget uncertainty. Today's announcement is one part of the Department's efforts to strengthen the rural economy.

"These changes are intended to help agricultural producers and rural small businesses throughout America," Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack said. "They will streamline and simplify the application process and give businesses more time to do what they do best: innovate, create jobs and serve their rural communities."

The proposed changes would affect applications for loans and grants through USDA Rural Development's Rural Energy for America Program (REAP). They would:

- Reduce paperwork, especially for projects under \$80,000;
- Implement a more objective and uniform system to score applications;
- Authorize funding for refurbished and retrofitted renewable energy systems;
- Reduce certain reporting requirements;
- Establish a quarterly application period for applicants seeking only guaranteed loans. This change is intended to make the program more appealing to lenders and to ensure that funds are available year-round.

REAP is one of USDA's most popular renewable energy and energy efficiency programs. USDA is accepting comments on the proposed rule through June 11, 2013.
