In his presentation, Showers warned his audiences to avoid contact with any wire. The Bon Homme-Yankton wires carry 7,200 volts, far more powerful than the 120 or 240 volts that enter many homes, he said.

"Electricity is always looking for a path to the ground, and you don't want to be the link between the power and the ground," he said. "If you see the wire on the ground, stay away from it."

Even underground lines contain dangers, Showers said.

"More and more wires are underground, which is good. But you have to know where (it's safe) to dig today," he said. "Call 911 if there is a medical emergency. Call 811 before you dig."

At the machinery display, Hunhoff and Kronaizl talked about loader safety, rider safety, power take-off (PTO) safety and lawn mower safety.

The two men stressed cardinal

rules for machinery: Never touch it, stand on it or lean over it. And beware of slow-moving machinery, because you don't know if it will turn and, if so, in which direction.

Youngsters should even be wary of flying debris from nearby equipment, such as lawn mowers, the men said.

"We stress the right way of getting things done," Hunhoff said. "These kids may even go home to their parents and say, 'You're not doing it the right way.

Wednesday's camp was fun and educational for the kids, Hunhoff said. However, the lessons learned can also prove vital in an emergency, he said.

"Today, we had kids who saw something and said, 'It could hurt you but not kill you.' But we have had people who were killed in accidents," he said. "We're trying to do something to prevent accidents. If we save one person, this is all worth it."

Brasel taught safety of another type, allowing youngsters to see animals such as Mr. Nibbles the rabbit, Rose the chicken, Ozzie the Doggie and even horses.

"We try to get to kids that many animals are OK, but if you meet someone else's animals, you should ask (before petting or handling them),' she said. "We also teach kids to always wash your hands with soap and water after touch animals."

Inside the 4-H building, Kurtenbach showed simulated examples of how quickly grain can collapse around a person. He showed the speed in which grain pushes against the person, leaving him unable to move or even breathe.

"You guessed it would take 2 minutes, but it was more like 9 or 10 seconds before someone was buried up to his head in grain," he told his young audience.

Kurtenbach showed methods, such as a rescue tube, used for extracting a person from a grain pile or silo. However, the best advice is to avoid the accident, he said.

Stay out of the bins and off the grain piles, or you may get trapped," he said. "And stay away from equipment unless there is someone there to

In her work with a hospital emergency department, Gehl sees all sorts of farm accidents.

"You see grandpas with their 2year-olds on the tractor, lawn mower or four wheeler," she said. "Then they hit a bump, and the child goes flying. I have seen too many of those situations." Gehl was dismayed to see the large

number of youngsters at Wednesday's camp who admitted they rarely — or never — wear a helmet, seat belt or other safety equipment.

Wednesday's farm safety camp addressed the kind of hazards that are unique to farms, Gehl said.

"I work with a lot of animal (cases), such as a bull that may charge you. It's even part of our trauma criteria (at the hospital)," she

plans to hire more audit staff after start of the new fiscal year on July 1.

"I believe this will save taxpayers money through their work, and be a good investment for the state," he

Foley said in one case the department paid more than \$265,000 in private health insurance premiums for one person, when it would have been far cheaper to process the health care services through Medicaid. Department files indicated that the program's administrator knew the approach wasn't cost-effective but continued to make payments of more than \$9,600 per month, Foley said.

Auditors found numerous instances in which program participants paid no premiums for health insurance, yet received payouts from the state for expenses they never incurred. Foley said some of the payments appear to rise to the level of criminal fraud.

In other cases, auditors found payments for dental, vision, life and long-term disability insurance, and parking expenses — all of which are beyond the scope of the program, Foley said.

Foley also argued that the department violated state and federal tax laws by not issuing forms to recipients,
