Dutch oven cooking, disc golf and kayaking. There will be hands-on opportunities. For example, you can try your hand at archery," he said. "We'll also have things like the rocket launch zone. And you can watch the Pinewood Derby at 11 a.m., near the amphitheater."

In addition, the Heartland Humane Society will offer its "Meet And Greet" with pets starting at 10 a.m. The day also features re-enactor John Timm portraying Dakota Territory Gov. Arthur Mellette.

The weekend kicks off Friday with the sixth annual educational festival. This year's registration finds 285 students from Yankton Middle School, Sacred Heart School of Yankton, Elkhorn Valley, Laurel-Concord, Lynch Public School, Andes Central, Scotland and Gayville-Volin.

This year's festival features 24 stations with a variety of topics, said Mary Robb with the City of Yankton. "We have a mix of history, science and culture, with time for question-and-answer at each station," she said.

The festival offers experiences that can't be duplicated in the classroom, Robb said.

'The kids get to see real life instead of just learning about it from a textbook," she said. "And if the students are interested in going to college for these careers, it could pique their interest along those lines.

The National Park Service's mobile ranger station will be on hand both Friday and Saturday, offering another attraction, Smith said. The vehicle shares the history, culture and scientific facts about the Missouri River

The 11th annual river clean-up returns on Saturday, with registration beginning at 8 a.m. at the Riverside Park boat ramp, Smith said. A safety talk begins at 8:15 a.m. We'll hit the water by 8:30

a.m. We'll go from Gavins Point Dam to two miles east of Rush Island," Smith said. "We'll have nine boats provided by state and federal agencies or private parties. If people aren't comfortable on boats, they can work the

shoreline at Riverside Park or across the (Meridian) bridge on the Nebraska side.

Besides volunteers, the effort receives assistance from Yankton Minimum Unit inmates who stay on the dock and unload trash.

The clean-up continues to make a difference even after a decade of collecting trash and debris, Smith said. 'We've collected more than 100 tons of trash that's never going back into the river. It's really made an impact on keeping the river beautiful," he said

This weekend's events provide a springboard into the Clean Boat Event May 3-10, said Paul Lepisto with the Izaak Walton League of America.

The event sends teams to seven boat ramps above and below Gavins Point Dam, Lepisto said. The brief outreach reminds boaters and anglers about the importance of clean boats in fighting invasive species.

"I think, if the weather allows us to do it, it's going to impact the same amount of boaters in that time period as when we did it over multiple weekends," he said.

In the past, the Clean Boat

Event suffered setbacks by sticking to weekends, Lepisto said. Some weekends had terrible weather, and the boating season was well under way toward the end of the multiweekend campaign.

"The invasive species are literally at the face of Gavins Point Dam," he said. "They haven't gotten into Lewis and Clark Lake yet. We have kept them out of the reservoir, but they have gotten into the (downstream) James River."

Stopping the spread of invasive species remains critical, Lepisto said. Interested volunteers can contact him at (605) 220-1219.

'The old adage that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure is really true with invasive species," he said. "It's virtually impossible to eradicate them once they are introduced into a new body of water."

Smith believes the festival activities will only grow in coming years. "Our communities have strong ties to the river, and these events really showcase our environment and how unique it is," he said.




