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Summer vacation will begin a little earlier for Yankton School District students.

The Yankton School Board amended the 2013-14 school calendar Monday afternoon, making Friday, May 16, the last day of school for public school students. The board took the action during a special meeting at the YSD administration building.

The final day of school had been pushed back to May 19 to account for a snow day, according to YSD Superintendent Wayne Kindle. However, that is no longer necessary, he said.

"We're short a day, but if you have enough hours

and minutes in your school year, you do not have to make the time up," Kindle said during the meeting. "I did not bring those numbers, but we are well above the required hours and minutes for elementary, middle school and high school.'

The amended calendar also includes teacher workdays the following week on May 19 and May 21. A teacher inservice will be held May 20.

During Monday's meeting, the board also entered into executive session to discuss contractual matters. No action was taken.
