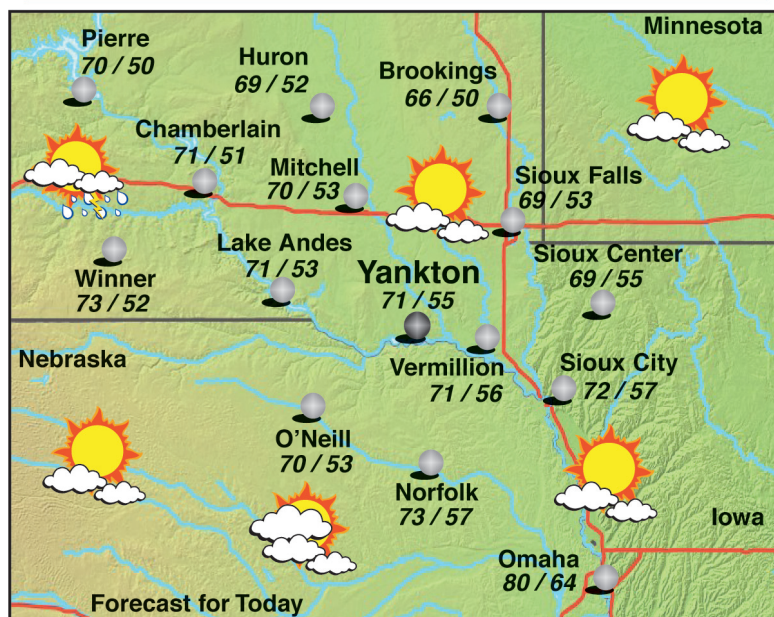

Archaeology Camp Registration Under Way

PIERRE — The South Dakota State Historical Society's Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) is sponsoring a three-day Archaeology Camp for students going into grades 4-6 for the 2014-2015 school year.

Camp dates are June 3-5, from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. CDT. The program is structured for students to attend all three days. Registration is limited to the first 20 applicants, first-come, first-served.

Archaeology Camp is an active, outdoor experience located on the old Fort Galpin archaeological site near the

Oahe Downstream Recreation Area below the Oahe Dam north of Pierre. Students should be prepared to hike and to work in the dirt alongside of professional archaeologists.

Students will learn an introduction to the field of archaeology, why archaeological excavations are held, what stories artifacts can tell about the past, the history of fur trading posts, how to map a site and how to use team-building skills. In addition to excavations at the site, other fun activities will include making pottery, learning to recognize animal tracks and making track molds,

and learning flint knapping, the method used to make historic tools. A trip to the Turtle Effigy and the Oahe Chapel is also included.

Registration will close on May 12 or when the camp is full, whichever comes first. The registration fee must accompany the registration and release forms found on the SHPO web site at <http://history.sd.gov/Preservation/>. Click on the link at the top of the page.

WALL ST. RECAP

The stock market closed slightly higher as enthusiasm about an improving U.S. service sector outweighed concerns about China.

Stocks started the day lower on news that manufacturing contracted in China for the fourth straight month in April. Indexes erased their losses in midmorning trading after a U.S. trade group reported that service firms grew more quickly last month.

ON MONDAY:

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 17.66 points, or 0.1 per-

cent, to 16,530.55.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index climbed 3.52 points, or 0.2 percent, to 1,884.66.

The Nasdaq composite rose 14.16 points, or 0.3 percent, to 4,138.06.

FOR THE YEAR:

The Dow is down 46.11 points, or 0.3 percent.

The S&P 500 index is up 36.30 points, or 2 percent.

The Nasdaq composite is down 38.53 points, or 0.9 percent.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly higher Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for July delivery rose 13 cents to \$7.29 a bushel; July corn was 8.50 cents higher at 5.08 a bushel; July oats were 1.75 cents higher at \$3.5175 a bushel; while July soybeans fell 7.50 cents to \$14.6325 a bushel.

Beef was lower and pork were higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle fell .53 cent to \$1.3725 a pound; August feeder cattle was .52 cent lower at \$1.8980 a pound; while June lean hogs rose .13 cent to \$1.2235 a pound.
