DWU Cruises To GPAC Women's Golf Title

The Dakota Wesleyan women's golf had a lofty goal heading into 2014.

It wanted to win the Great Plains Athletic Conference (GPAC) championship by 80 strokes.

Instead, the Tigers won another team title by 59 strokes. They closed out their sixth straight crown after Monday's fourth and final qualifier, at Fox Run Golf Course in Yankton.

"We just wanted to win this thing big," said DWU sophomore Lauren Fitts, who won the individual title for a second consecutive year.

'We wanted to keep on rolling before nationals."

And for the 11th straight year, the Tigers are headed to the NAIA National Championships, set for May 20-23 in Lincoln, Neb.

Dakota Wesleyan came into Monday's fourth round up 50 shots on Northwestern. And by the time the dust had cleared at Fox Run, the Tigers had ballooned their lead to 59 shots — 1308 to 1367. Mount Marty College finished in fourth place, best in school his-

"Any time you're up by that much, it's real easy to get lackadaisical," DWU coach Adam Anderson said. "But our girls knew we'd play well and win.

"We just had to keep things in focus." The true drama for the final round was for the in-

dividual championship. Fitts held a 2-shot lead over senior teammate Chelsea Burback, but finished with a 6-shot victory. Fitts carded a 77 (tied for the best mark on Mon-

day), while Burback shot an 81. I felt more confident (Monday) than then last two rounds, actually," Fitts said later.

Fitts, a native of Brookings, started Monday's round strong with consecutive pars before "struggling," she said. A birdie on 15 and three straight

pars to close the round, however, cinched the title. And winning for the second straight year means more, Fitts said, when she can share the success with her teammates.

"It feels really awesome to follow up last year like

Miller Repeats As First-Team All-GPAC

The all-time hits leader in Mount Marty College baseball history has added one more honor to his resume, a secondstraight first-team all-Great Plains Athletic Conference se-

The senior first baseman was one of seven Lancers hon-ored by the GPAC, which announced its league awards on Monday. He was also named to the league's "Gold Glove" team.

Miller batted .447 on the season, with 17 doubles, five home runs and 52 RBI. Defensively, he had just three for a .993 fielding percentage.

He finished his career with MMC records of 242 hits and 56 doubles, as well as 15 home runs and 165 RBI. He also had a .990 fielding percentage and played in 185 contests.

"Jared was one of the better players our conference has seen," said MMC head baseball coach Andy Bernatow. "He put up some pretty big power numbers, when you're talking the BBCOR (bat) era. He got a lot of hits in key situations.

Miller was honored by the GPAC all four seasons, earning second-team honors as a sophomore and honorable mention
