trolled burn, Scherschligt stressed. If a tree pile is being burned, wind conditions for the next several days should be checked, he added. Many of the fires this year have been the result of high winds picking up embers from a tree pile days after it had been lit.

Scherschligt said the resolution makes enacting a burn ban easier if the County Commission isn't set to meet for some time.

"In 2012, we ended up having a two-week period before we could enact no burning when it was so dry because some of (the commissioners) weren't here," he stated.

Fire officials were anxious to rescind the burn ban in order to burn CRP acres before May 15, according to Scherschligt.

While recent moisture helped ease dry conditions in Yankton County, he said it is a tenuous situation.

"The fire departments are going to be monitoring the situation closely because we're in that back and forth between, 'Should we or shouldn't we lift this burn ban?'" Scherschligt said. "Most of them feel we're good now for the next couple weeks as long as we get a little precipitation. But if we don't get anything this weekend, it might go the other way."

WORK UNDER WAY ON COUNTY ROADS

In other business Tuesday, Yankton County Highway Superintendent Brian Gustad updated the commission on road work that is getting under way.

"If any of you have been out by Volin, you've noticed that the work on 306th Street has commenced," he said. "They're doing a widening for the mailbox turn-outs. That's a federal requirement. Our own crews were doing a culvert clean-out, and possibly a culvert replacement."

A road closure will be necessitated by bridge work along the stretch, Gustad added. A four- or five-day detour along 305th Street will go into effect.

Gustad said he hopes that work on and around the nearby bridge along 301st

Street will be done prior to the 306th Street closure.

The bridge closure along 306th will occur after the Memorial Day holiday.

"The milling and asphalt crews will be in as soon as the bridge work is done," Gustad said. "We plan on having that project completed by the end of June."

Work on the 301st Street bridge is done.

"But if any of you have driven that road this past spring, that road has a lot of heaving with the winter freeze," Gustad stated. "We're looking at remedying that. We're going to mill that road out for approximately 1,800 feet and lay drainage tile in the road bed. It will get that to drain out, because the water sitting underneath there heaves the road up. It's been a constant problem for the last 20 years."

Gustad said he believes there are springs underneath the road.

"We're hoping to have that back open before they start construction (along 306th Street)," he stated.

It might be gravel for a month or so before asphalt is installed, Gustad said.

Work on 446th Avenue will be done once asphalt can be obtained locally, he continued. Currently, it would have to be shipped in from someplace like Sioux Falls, which adds significant costs, according to Gustad.

"I hope the traveling public understands we are trying to do something with it so there aren't the big hunks that catch on cars and tires," he said. "We've had a few blow-outs and issues with the (spring) thaw. The frost was really deep this year — four feet or more."

Also Tuesday, the commission:

- had a first reading for a historic preservation ordinance;
- approved a \$64,499 bid from Jim Hawk Trailers for a Load King trailer;
- appointed a committee to address load limits on county roads; and
- met Stephanie Smolek, who is the new 4-H Youth Development Coordinator.

WALL ST. RECAP

The stock market closed broadly lower Tuesday as investors found little to cheer in corporate earnings reports. A plunge in Twitter led Internet companies sharply lower.

ON TUESDAY:

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 129.53 points, or 0.8 percent, to 16,401.02. The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 16.94 points, or 0.9 percent, to 1,867.72. The Nasdaq composite dropped 57.30 points, or 1.4 percent, to 4,080.76.

Prescribed Fire At Bow Creek Today

Missouri National Recreational River is planning to conduct a prescribed fire at the Bow Creek Recreational Area north of Wynot, Nebraska, on Wednesday, May 7, pending favorable weather conditions.

The burn area is approximately 20 acres of restored tall grass prairie. The burn will be conducted by firefighters from the National Park Service, Bureau of Indian Affairs and other federal agencies. These specially trained wild land fire fighters will monitor the progress of the burn with a fire engine and water tanker on site.

The property will be closed during fire operations, which may last more than a day, but will reopen when the fire is extinguished. The purpose of this burn is to promote growth of native grasses and wildflowers that are adapted to wildfire, while inhibiting the growth of exotic plant species such as Canada thistle and Siberian elm.

Missouri National Recreational River Biological Technician Brian Korman says, "This prescribed fire will enhance restoration of native vegetation on the Bow Creek Recreational Area property. Our goal is to use prescribed burns to maintain the native grass plantings at this site. This property gives visitors a window into what the land adjacent to the Missouri River was like when Native Americans, explorers and fur traders experienced this magnificent landscape."
