help reduce the deficit, we do not agree on the specifics of how to access those funds while maintaining the employees' benefit in the future," she said. "Based on teacher feedback, YEA would like to continue negotiations with the board in hopes of reaching an agreement beneficial to all parties.

Following last year's impasse declaration, the YSD and YEA were unable to reach an agreement in conciliation, which led to the YEA requesting a fact-finding hearing by the South Dakota Department of Labor and Regulation (SDDLR). Issues presented to the department included teacher pay, insurance cost and benefits, and requirements for teachers seeking

recall. The SDDLR recommended that YSD's position be adopted on all issues, and the school board imposed its last, best offer at its following meeting.

Both Fitzgerald and Larrington said they are disappointed that negotiations have reached an impasse again this

year, but they are hopeful that a deal can be made soon.
