- The bird house building contests, sponsored by the Izaak Walton League, and held under supervision of Joe Hunt, was extended for one week but closed on May 8. The contest requires that all bird houses entered be painted. Boys who have their houses built but not painted have been given until Wednesday, May 10 to paint them.
- A total of 209 young people have been checked for graduation from various courses at the Southern State Normal School and their names have been approved by the state board of Regents of Education. Upon completion of their work they will be granted diplomas at the annual commencement on Friday, May 26. This is the largest class to be graduated from Southern in the 41 years of its history.

50 YEARS AGO

Saturday, May 9, 1964

- Taking a cue from decades of success by the opposite sex the Tyndall Girl's track team walked off with team honors in the first Tyndall Girl's track meet here yesterday afternoon and evening.
