Yankton Area Mental Wellness Conf. Set

This year marks the 16th year for the Yankton Area Mental Wellness Conference to be held June 4-5. Register at www.yamwi.org.com by May 16 to attend the educational opportunity at Mount Marty College.

The conference is offering 30 breakouts from national, regional and local experts in their various fields plus four featured speakers.

The Wednesday Opening Address is by Jodee Blanco with an intense and inspirational message that cuts to the core of what it means to be a bullied child through the perspective only someone who was bullied herself can understand. Blanco is the author of the *New York Times* best-selling memoir, "Please Stop Laughing At Me." As the nation's only survivor turned activist/expert, she will also share some of her most unforgettable experiences working deep inside the trenches of America's schools.

U.S. Attorney Brendan Johnson will address Wednesday's General Session on the topic of Human Trafficking in South Dakota. Johnson was nominated by the president as the 40th United States Attorney for the District of South Dakota and was confirmed unanimously by the United States Senate in 2009. Johnson serves as South Dakota's chief federal law enforcement officer and supervise the prosecution of all federal

crimes and litigation of civil matters in which the United States government has an interest. Johnson co-chairs the South Dakota Law Enforcement Coordinating Committee, is a member of the Midwest High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area Executive Board, and serves on the Department of Justice's Terrorism and National Security Subcommittee.

Dr. JC Chamber, founding partner of Stronghold Counseling, Inc., is a South Dakota Licensed Psychologist and has provided training for school systems and therapists who work with students for the past 11 years. Dr. Chambers has been a Senior Trainer for Life Space Crisis Intervention since 1998, a senior trainer for Response Ability Pathways since 2004, and is a Licensed Addiction Counselor and AAMFT Approved Supervisor. He has worked with school districts training personnel in Canada, Australia, and across the United States. He is the featured for two General Sessions as well as two breakouts.

Presenting the Closing Address is David Jal, who dreamed of being a geography teacher. Jal was born and raised in northeast Africa in the Dunyal Village in southern Sudan. He did not plan on moving away but was forced out of the country when the civil war intensified in The Sudan. He was only 10 years old. His dream of teaching was replaced by the desire of surviving. After spending

nearly ten years in refugee camps in East Africa he was approved to be resettled in the United States. Having received a second chance in life, it is his hope to be able to contribute to the community and to those who need help the most, the homeless and other disenfranchised population.

The aforementioned speakers and their information are a very important part of the conference and there is much more: Continued Education Units will be earned as well as college credit — both graduate and undergraduate, the Exploring Careers in Health and Human Services high school class will attend the conference as well as display their class project posters, sponsors will have tables of available information/material, networking is a constant occurrence, delicious food will be devoured, silent auction items will be available for the shoppers, plus awards will be given.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mixed Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for July delivery fell 12.75 cents to \$7.2275 a bushel; July corn was 9 cents lower at 5.0750 a bushel; July oats were .25 cent higher at \$3.5325 a bushel; while July soybeans advanced 17.50 cents to \$14.87 a bushel.

Beef and pork were higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle rose .13 cent to \$1.3805 a pound; August feeder cattle was 1.10 cents higher at \$1.9137 a pound; while June lean hogs rose .02 cent to \$1.2017 a pound.

WALL ST. RECAP

The Dow Jones industrial average eked out a record on Friday after a choppy day of trading during which investors couldn't make up their minds whether to buy or sell. The Standard & Poor's 500 index also inched up, but is no higher than it was in early March, after waffling between weekly gains and losses most of that time.

ON FRIDAY:

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 32.37 points, or 0.2 percent, to 16,583.34.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 2.85 points, or 0.2 percent, to 1,878.48.

The Nasdaq composite rose 20.37 points, or 0.5 percent, to 4,071.87.

The Dow is up 70.45 points, or 0.4 percent.
