Conservative Group Trying To Reshape SD's GOP

RAPID CITY (AP) — A conservative grass-roots group in Rapid City that believes the state's Republican Party has drifted to the left has pledged to push its highly conservative messages in local and statewide races this year.

Twenty-two people associated with the group are challenging Republican incumbents who they perceive as too centrist, the *Rapid City Journal* reported on Sunday.

A former Republican state lawmaker and one of the founders of the organization, Bill Napoli, said the candidates are driven by the belief that the state's GOP has changed its stance on topics ranging from abortion to gay marriage. "I never left the party," Napoli said. "The party left me."

The group named itself The Wingnuts, poking fun at members' own far-right views.

Napoli said those who attend the group's meetings in Rapid City are particularly upset at South Dakota's Republican lawmakers for not blocking the adoption of Common Core education standards, increasing license plate fees in 2011 and showing some hesitation before the passage of a bill in 2013 that allowed school districts to let teachers and some school administrators bear arms.

"That was a horrible struggle to get that done," Napoli said. "So we won, but that bill should have just flown through."

However, the newspaper reported, political scientists dispute the group's left-leaning claim and say the party is the most conservative it's been in a century.

Songbird Species Getting Pushed North Into Canada

SIoux FALLS — The Baird's sparrow, a small songbird that spends its summers in a mostly Canadian swath that dips into grassland prairies in North Dakota, Montana and far northern South Dakota, could be opting for sole Canadian residency in the coming decades.

Climate change and a continuing conversion of grassland into corn and soybean fields will likely push the species' breeding grounds further north of the border by 2025, according to research from the U.S. Geological Survey's Earth Resources Observation and Science (EROS) Center in South Dakota.

Though the research submitted for journal review looked at 50 bird species, the displacement of the Baird's sparrow stands out. That could affect tourism in North Dakota, which draws in avid bird watchers looking to check the Baird's sparrow off their must-see lists.

The bird prefers short grassland, but its summer breeding spots can change with variations in precipitation, said Terry Sohl, a research physical scientist at the center who is leading the effort.

"They're a little bit nomadic ... and it tends to be tied to moisture. They don't like it too dry, they don't like it too moist," Sohl said.

Sohl's research predicts future land-use trends using the National Land Cover Database, an archive of Landsat satellite images for the entire planet dating back to 1972. Climate change is leading to a warmer, drier northern Great Plains, he said, and that combined with the continued loss of grassland to cropland is pushing the bird's summer breeding range further into Canada.

Julie Zickefoose, who has led tours for about a dozen years to spot the bird during Carrington, North Dakota's annual Potholes & Prairie Festi-

val, said the changes already are noticeable.

"They are getting harder to find," she said. "And it's not absolutely given that they'll be there where they were the year before."

The Baird's sparrow stands about five inches tall with a rather dull palette of brown, white and black, she said.

"As a bird to look at, it's not exciting. It's a tiny, pale, drab sparrow," said Zickefoose, an Ohio-based artist and author. "But it's a very limited range species and so it is a quest bird for a lot of bird-watchers."

Neil Shook, who manages the Chase Lake National Wildlife Refuge for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, said the Baird's sparrow is a tourism draw for North Dakota.

"We get birders from all over the country that come out here, usually specifically to locate a Baird's sparrow," Shook said.

The species prefers cool-season native grasses such as green needle, porcupine and some wheat grasses, and the refuge near Tappen, North Dakota, boasts block of solid grass for about 10,000 acres, he said.

"The amount of grass that we're losing is definitely going to have a negative effect on those birds," he said.

The birds are often heard before they're spotted, with Zickefoose describing their call as unique, "like three introductory notes and then a very soft beat-y trill that rises in inflection."

Arrival at the breeding grounds ranges from late April to early May, and fall migration back to southeastern Arizona, southwestern New Mexico, far western Texas, and north-central Mexico begins in September, according to the Audubon Society.

Shook hasn't yet seen or heard a Baird's sparrow at the refuge this spring.

"If they're not here now, they're going to be here very soon," he said.

Some Criticize SD Doctor On Various Med. Boards, Cite Conflict

SIoux FALLS (AP) — Some members of the medical community in South Dakota are raising conflict of interest questions regarding the work of a doctor who sits on multiple medical boards.

The *Argus Leader* reports Dr. Mary Carpenter has sat on the state's medical licensing board that also arbitrates complaints against physicians, while serving on the board of an insurance company that protects doctors from allegations of wrongdoing.

Critics say neutrality is critical in probes against physicians, and Carpenter can't do a policing job when she has a financial interest on the outcome. Carpenter declined to comment when reached by the newspaper.

The spokesman for Gov. Dennis Daugaard says the governor was not aware of Carpenter's relationship with the insurance company when he reappointed her to the Board of Medical and Osteopathic Examiners.

Mother, Boyfriend Charged In Death

HASTINGS, Neb. (AP) — The mother of a 4-year-old Hastings boy shot to death reportedly by his 9-year-old brother last month has been charged with negligent child abuse, as has her live-in boyfriend.

The *Hastings Tribune* reports that the Adams County Attorney's Office filed charges Thursday against the 29-year-old woman and her 30-year-old boyfriend.

The Associated Press generally does not identify juveniles accused of crimes. For that reason, the AP is not naming the adults or children involved in the case.

Authorities say police and school and mental health officials had concerns about the 9-year-old's often violent behavior and that officials had warned both his mother and her boyfriend to lock up all knives, other sharp items and guns in the house for weeks before the young boy was shot.

Settlement Reached Over Troubled Jail

NORTH PLATTE, Neb. (AP) — A settlement has been reached between Lincoln County and contractors over the botched construction of a jail that opened in 2011.

According to the agreement, the county will keep about \$273,000 it still owed Roche Constructors, general contractor for the project.

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners is expected to sign the agreement when it meets Monday, the *North Platte Telegraph* reported Saturday.

Cracked concrete floors and a mold-riddled roof had to be replaced before the jail opened, and the county later filed a claim citing a host of other problems, including broken curbs, water leaks, debris left around the project, plugged overflow drains and outdoor sections left without landscaping that caused soil erosion problems.

Construction delays also cost the county in other ways, according to the claim. When inmates surpassed the capacity of the old jail, they had to be transported and housed at other jails at the county's expense.

Roche filed a counterclaim, seeking outstanding payment for the work done.

A national mediation board in Minneapolis handled the claims.

Catholic School System Hacker Caught

SIoux FALLS (AP) — Sioux Falls Catholic Schools says a computer hacker who temporarily shut down phone, email and Internet services has been apprehended.

Internet and email were down all day Thursday at the O'Gorman junior and senior high schools and at the six Catholic elementary schools in Sioux Falls. All systems were running again Friday.

Superintendent Tom Lorang wouldn't tell the *Argus Leader* Friday night whether the hacker is a student or say how officials were able to identify the individual.

Sioux Falls Police say the situation involves a juvenile and couldn't confirm whether someone had been arrested.

Noem, Thune Criticize EPA Rule

WASHINGTON (AP) — Landlocked South Dakota is again fighting with the federal government about water — this time over whether the Obama administration can regulate streams and smaller bodies of water.

Republicans U.S. Rep. Kristi Noem and U.S. Sen. John Thune have criticized a proposal that would allow the Environmental Protection Agency to regulate seasonal and rain-dependent streams and determine on a case-by-case basis the regulation of other smaller bodies of water.

Noem and Thune say the proposal diminishes states' influence and could have potentially significant economic effects.

Their concerns have been echoed by dozens of other lawmakers as well as farm lobbying groups.

Democratic Sen. Tim Johnson has not weighed in.

The EPA argues it isn't expanding its authority, just clarifying it, and that the change will protect the country's water supply.

S.D. Invests State Dollars On China Trip


PIERRE (AP) — South Dakota Gov. Dennis Daugaard is leading a weeklong China trade mission through Friday at a cost of \$93,000 for the state.

The Republican believes the trip is worth the expense.

Daugaard is hoping to expand the state's export markets, building on his two prior trips that resulted in brokered deals. In an interview this week, Daugaard says there is no specific sales goal for the trip.

His past two trips to China in 2013 and 2012, federal grants have covered most of the expenses.

This time, the state will pay for up to 30 percent of costs of the companies joining Daugaard and the seven state staffers, including some from the Governor's Office of Economic Development and the Department of Agriculture.
