Atlanta Shines On Starr

Falcons Take USD Linebacker In Seventh Round; Bryant, O'Neill Also Get NFL Opportunities

Tyler Starr is taking his talents to Georgia.

Starr (6-5, 250), the record-setting linebacker from the University of South Dakota, was drafted by the Atlanta Falcons in the seventh round (255th overall) of the NFL Draft on Saturday.

Starr, who spent the day in his hometown of Little Rock, Iowa, with his family, was the second to last player taken. He left Sunday for Åt-

"This is an unreal feeling," Starr said in a statement. "We waited all day long for this to

happen, and when it did we were overwhelmed. My son, Hunter, turns three (Sunday) and it was great to celebrate this day with him. I fly to Atlanta soon and I can't wait to get started.

Starr led the MVFC in sacks (9.0), tackles for loss (15.0) and forced fumbles (4) this past season. He finished second on the team in tackles with 71. He also had an interception and was credited with four pass breakups. During his three seasons in Vermillion, Starr accumulated 196 tackles, including a program record 27 sacks and 13 forced fumbles.

Starr's selection gives USD

NFL draftees twice in a three-year span, as offensive lineman Tom Compton was picked by Washington in the sixth round (193rd overall) in 2012. Starr is the 13th Coyote taken in the NFL draft, and the first Coyote linebacker selected since Craig Austin was taken by the Seattle Seahawks in the 1982 draft.

Starr, however, wasn't the only Coyote player to hear from an NFL team over the

Cornerback Jarrid Bryant signed a free agent contract with the St. Louis Rams and offensive lineman Cody O'Neill was invited to the Minnesota Vikings minicamp.

For Bryant, a native of Corona, Calif., spent just one of his five collegiate seasons on the defensive side of the ball.



Track & Field: 3 Coyotes Win At Nebraska

LINCOLN, Neb. — Teivaskie Lewin won the men's long jump, Brant Haase won the men's 1,500-meters and Madison Mills won the women's pole vault as the South Dakota track and field teams competed at the Nebraska Invitational on Saturday. It was the Coyotes' final meet before The Summit League Outdoor Track and Field Championships, which start on Thursday in Fargo, N.D.

Lewin won the long jump with a mark of 23 feet, 0 inches, topping Nebraska's Justin English by seven inches. Lewin also placed third in the 110-hurdles in 13.99, breaking The Summit League's top-time of 14.19 that he set last weekend at the Howard Wood Dakota Relays.

Brant Haase added a win and led the Coyotes to a sweep of the top-three positions in the men's 1,500 with a time of 3:57.43. Isaac Allen finished second at 3:59.10 and Stephen Nielson was third in

Mills took the women's pole vault title with a mark of 13-2®, beating Nebraska's Paule Andrie on attempts. Mills cleared that height on her first attempt while Andrie needed two attempts.

Two men set new personal records while recording second-place finishes. Denton Stephens set a new PR in the hammer throw with a mark of 190-10. That mark broke his previous best by an inch and ranks second on USD's all-time performance list. Mach Dojiok finished second in the 800 in 1:51.68, breaking his previous best time of 1:51.90 by .22 sec-

In the men's discus, Cody Snyder finished second while competing unattached with a mark of 177-11 while Dustin Valind was third with a mark of 158-2. Connor Fitzsimmons rounded out the men's top-three finishes with thirdplace finishes in the long jump (21-11) and triple jump $(43-10 \ 1/2)$.

Outside of Mills, the women recorded four second-place finishes. Meghan Dennis placed second in the javelin (137-4), Kati Nelson was runner-up in the 400 hurdles (1:05.64), Katie Wetzstein finished second in the 1,500 (4:38.31) and Ashley Thompson was runner-up in the triple jump (39-10 1/2). Thompson finished behind USD graduate assistant coach Kenna Wolter, who won the triple jump with a mark of 42-4 3/4

Danielle Waldner finished third in the shot put (46-11), Elysa Reinke was third in the discus (134-1) and Amber Eichkorn was third in the 1,500 (4:41.35) to round out the USD women's top-three

The women's 4x100 and 4x400 relays also added wins. The 4x100 team of Amber Ewers, Molly Ervin, DeAsia Garrett and Ravan Kott won in 48.54 while the 4x400 team of Nelson, Lindsey Montileaux, Rachel Weinandt and Jessica Feldman won in 4:06.35.
