"I am asking the Planning Commission to make a recommendation that would go back to the County Commission," Garrity stated.

Toby Morris of Dougherty & Company has been assisting Dakota Plains with the approval process for its proposed facility. He told the *Press & Dakotan* Monday that Dakota Plains officials do not plan to attend today's meet-

On April 11, Matt Winsand, the general manager and CEO of Dakota Plains, told the *Press & Dakotan* he was disappointed with an April 8 discussion that had taken place with the Planning Commission regarding the TID. He said the company would look at other potential sites for a grain shuttle facility during the following 60

Last week, Winsand met with the Bon Homme County Commission, and today he is scheduled to speak with the Clay County Commission.

Morris said Dakota Plains is making a good-faith effort to find a long-term partner for its grain facility and is not attempting to play the counties off one another. With that in mind, company officials will maintain its break from discussing the project with Yankton County officials.

Because the County Commission gave the Planning Commission a directive to come up with a TID recommendation at the Napa junction, Garrity said the decision was made to proceed.

There has not been a formal letter to the County Commission or my office from Dakota Plains stating that they are withdrawing from the process. Nor have I had the county commissioners say they no longer wanted the recommendation from the Planning Commission,' he stated. "Based on that, we're going ahead with the process.

Dakota Plains has already received permission from the County Commission to build a grain shuttle facility that will include a rail loop at what is known as the Napa junction, where the stateowned Napa-to-Platte rail line joins the Burlington Northern Santa Fe-owned line.

However, the company has said the project won't move forward without a TID to help cover infrastructure

Serving as a basis for Garrity's proposals are TIF revenue projections supplied by Mackey based on Dakota Plains' vision for developing the 192-acre site northwest of Yankton at the Napa junction during the next five years.

This gives us a foundation," Garrity said of the various proposals. "Once we get done with this, there will be a decision that will be applied to Napa Junction whether it's Dakota Plains or another developer. One way or another, I believe this gives us a foundation to move on the next project. We will have done a lot of the research and decision making. We can tell a developer what is expected."

Erickson said they settled on a town square design because it was believed this would have the most benefit.


