

WALL ST. RECAP

The stock market returned to record levels on Monday as investors regained their appetite for riskier stocks. After beating down Internet and small companies for two months, investors decided that those stocks had fallen enough. Among the big gainers were Twitter and Facebook, which had plunged in March and April. The Russell 2000, an index made up of small companies, climbed the most in two months.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 18.17 points, or 1 percent, to 1,896.65.
The Nasdaq composite rose 71.99 points, or 1.8 percent, to 4,143.86.

The Dow is up 118.81 points, or 0.72 percent.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly lower Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
Wheat for July delivery fell 7.50 cents to \$7.15 a bushel; July corn was 8 cents lower at 4.9950 a bushel; July oats were 3.75 cents higher at \$3.57 a bushel; while July soybeans declined 21.75 cents to \$14.6525 a bushel.

Beef mixed and pork was lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. June live cattle fell .40 cent to \$1.3765 a pound; August feeder cattle was .50 cent higher at \$1.9087 a pound; while June lean hogs fell 1.17 cents to \$1.1900 a pound.
