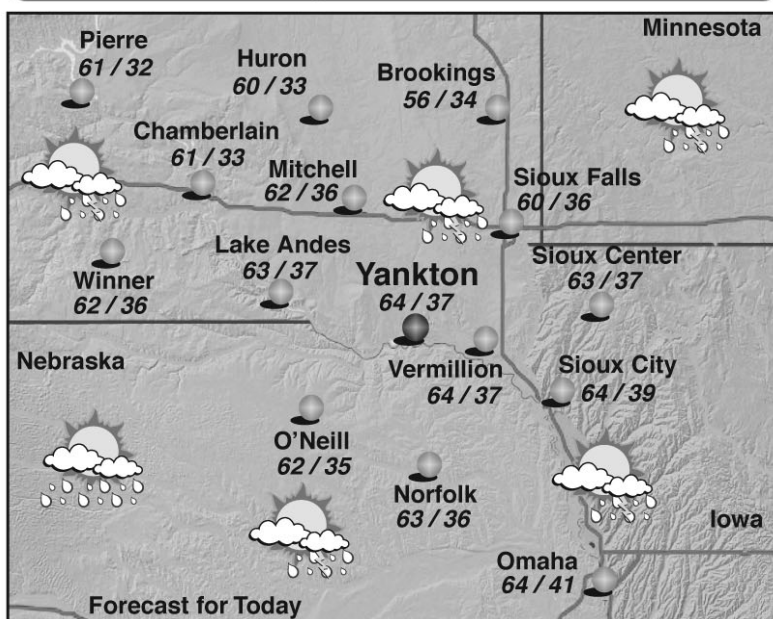

 • South Dakota's 56-year-old capitol building almost blew her top Tuesday, in apparent enthusiasm over the warm weather that prevailed in the capital city. Workmen were busy late Tuesday afternoon taking stained glass windows from around the dome before they burst out of their frames.
 • The first annual Gen. Omar Bradley award will be made by the Bulova Watch Co., Inc., during the military review which is a feature of Governor's Day at South Dakota State (Brookings). Serving as professor of military science at S. D. State in 1919-1920, Gen. Bradley

arrived at the Jackrabbit school as a captain and left as a major - and he "organized classes in boxing and wrestling" as well as assisting as football line coach, according to old South Dakota State records. During WWII, Gen. Bradley, presently chairman of the board of Bulova Watch Co., had commands in the Northern Tunisian and Sicilian campaigns, commanded the First Army in Normandy and headed the largest tactical command in all military history as commanding officer in 1944-45. He later served as Veterans Affairs administrator and chairman of the U. S. Joint Chiefs of Staff before joining the Bulova company.

Dakota, the state of South Dakota is behind it. Gov. Daugaard actually has put us on his priority use if we do get this built — we'll be one of the number one spots for economic development in the state of South Dakota. We will allow development.

Dakota Plains Ag Center is a limited liability company (LLC), he told commissioners, and is a joint venture between an agriculture company located in Kansas City, Missouri, and Cargill, located in Minneapolis. Their business status allows them, he said, to actively recruit other businesses to come in and locate near their facility.

"We have three board members from each side, and we run it as a profit center," Winsand said. "With the LLC, the money stays with us, and we're about to invest in two other projects."

Dakota Plains Ag currently operates a grain terminal at Beardsley, located six miles south of Parkston.

Winsand he hoped that day to learn more about the steps, processes and guidelines Clay County has in place in terms of zoning and Tax Increment Financing (TIF) districts.

"Our goal is for it to be built and at full capacity to handle 30 million bushels of grain," he said.

Dakota Plains had been working to build the facility on a site between 436th Avenue and 437th Avenue, and north of Highway 50, in Yankton County in an area known as Napa junction.

"I know the roads were an issue in Yankton County. What other issues were there?" asked Clay County Commission Chairman Dusty Passick.

"The TIF was a bit of an issue ... but the biggest thing is that it's about a \$12 to \$15 million premium to build at the (Napa) junction," Winsand said, "because they want us to upgrade eight miles of road to concrete at about \$1.5 million a mile. It takes a bite into a profit, and that's when the board said, 'Hey, maybe find something more attractive, a little closer to the road, so we can get rid of that big expense.'"

"At the last commissioner meeting in Yankton, it was

very obvious that TIF was going to be a hard thing for them to understand, and it was only four miles of road to start with," he said. "Then they added the other eight, which just took the project to a point where we need to look at our return on investment, and we decided we need to look elsewhere."

"Is Yankton off the board? I guess I don't want to put us in a position of being a threat or pawn to get Yankton to become more cooperative," Passick said.

"No, we've been open and honest with everybody," Winsand said. "We're analyzing the three locations in Clay County, Bon Homme County and Yankton County. There are some advantages in each county ... ultimately, it's the six board members who get to decide where to build this thing. We're not playing any games; our board is serious about these three locations, and when we put it all together in our model, we'll pick the spot that makes the best return on our investment."

The Dakota Plains Ag board will meet on Monday, and will hold a retreat meeting at its Parkston location on June 26.

"On June 26, we'll decide which location to build it," Winsand said, "and then we'll just start the process, basically on July 1. Whatever site is approved, we'll start with the zoning, start with the necessary process and procedures at that time."

The commission took no formal action following Winsand's presentation.

"I think we'd be very willing to talk with you and work with you in the process and see where it leads," Passick said. "... We look forward to working with you."

Investigation Continues In Death Following Chase

MACY, Neb. — The Nebraska State Patrol is continuing its investigation into a weekend chase that crossed three states before the suspect apparently took his life.

Eric Johnson, 38, of Elk Point was pursued Saturday evening through South Dakota, Iowa and Nebraska before the chase ended near Macy in Thurston County, Nebraska. Johnson was driving a Ford F150 pickup, which came to a stop after hitting spike strips set up by authorities near the Highway 75/94 junction.

Law enforcement officers found Johnson in his pickup and unresponsive with a gunshot wound to his head, according to the Nebraska State Patrol. Johnson was pronounced dead on Saturday, and an autopsy was being performed, the NSP said.

NSP spokeswoman Deb Collins told the Press & Dakotan on Tuesday that the patrol is continuing its investigation into the Nebraska portion of the pursuit. She reported no new developments in the case.

In the meantime, it appears Good Samaritans saved the life of Johnson's wife in the midst of a domestic dispute with the suspect.

The North Sioux City Police Department released details to the Press & Dakotan on the start of the incident that led to the tri-state pursuit.

At approximately 7:30 p.m. Saturday, 38-year-old Melonie Johnson of Elk Point met with her husband, Eric Johnson, at the intersection of Northshore Drive and Military Road in North Sioux City. The couple were having

marital issues, and Mr. Johnson produced a gun and threatened to shoot Mrs. Johnson, according to the North Sioux City police.

Mrs. Johnson then waved down a passing vehicle, who assisted her in fleeing from her husband. The assisting party was the Gary and Mary Olson family from rural Jefferson.

Eric Johnson gave chase after his wife, who was now fleeing in the Olson vehicle. Mr. Johnson chased them through North Sioux City, then north on I-29 from Exit 2.

Eric Johnson fired several shots at the fleeing Olson vehicle, an estimated four or five rounds. Of those shots, three rounds struck the vehicle. Shelby Olson was struck by one of the fired rounds.

Shelby Olson was transported to Mercy Medical Center with non-life threatening injuries to her back. No further information is available on her condition.

Mr. Johnson fled to Iowa, then into Nebraska, where his vehicle was disabled. Authorities believe Mr. Johnson took his own life.

The assisting agencies included the Union County sheriff's office, South Dakota Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI) and the Sioux City Police Department.

The interstate pursuit involved sheriff's offices in Thurston County; Woodbury County, Iowa, and law enforcement agencies in Walthill, Macy and Winnebago, Nebraska, and Sioux City, Iowa.
