bullying to the charge that he refuses to allow a Parent-Teacher Association (PTA).

The superintendent called some of the accusations "absolute, blatant, outright untruths," including one allegation he told Freeman Public students they couldn't play soccer at Freeman Academy if the private school didn't provide football players for Freeman Public.

Hotchkiss said some criticisms of him — such as not allowing foreign exchange students — were school district policy, not his decision.

In response to another criticism, he said he was following the school board's directive in filling a volleyball coaching vacancy.

Hotchkiss concluded that he acts in the best interest of the students and district.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mixed Wednesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for July delivery declined 19 cents to \$6.9025 a bushel; July corn was 7.25 cents lower at 4.9550 a bushel; July oats were .75 cent higher at \$3.5625 a bushel; while July soybeans rose 3 cents to

\$14.8675 a bushel.

Beef and pork were higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

June live cattle rose .45 cent to \$1.3745 a pound; August feeder cattle was .78 cent higher at \$1.9245 a pound; while June lean hogs rose .97 cent to \$1.2057 a pound.

WALL ST. RECAP

Stock indexes fell on Wednesday as investors favored safer assets, a day after the Standard & Poor's 500 index climbed above 1,900 for the first time.

Bond prices rose, pushing the yield on the 10-year Treasury note to its lowest in more than six months, and investors turned their backs on stocks that would stand to benefit most in a reviving economy.

The Dow Jones industrial average dropped 101.47 points, or 0.6 percent, to 16,613.97.
The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 8.92 points, or 0.5 percent, to 1,888.53.

The Nasdaq composite fell 29.54 points, or 0.7 percent, to 4,100.63.
