training and was out of competition for a week — missing the Howard Wood Relays.

Through it all, Hilson ran on USD's cross country team for all four seasons, and was a member of the track team for four seasons — competing in three.

"All we know is being a student and being a runner, and now they're both done," she said. "It'll be weird to start a whole new life."

As for what's next, Hilson leaves May 27 for St. Cloud, Minnesota, where she has an internship lined up with an Occupational Therapy clinic. She plans to potentially apply to an OT school as well, she said.

First, though, comes the matter of completing her career at the conference outdoor meet in Fargo. Hilson enters the meet ranked fourth in the 5,000-meter run and 23rd in the 1500. The 10K is her "focus" race, however, she said.

"I just want to place," Hilson said, "and make a difference on the team for my last meet."

Hilson has the 10K only one other time this season, at the prestigious Mt. SAC Relays in California.

Kerr Spurns Knicks, Agrees To Coach Warriors

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The Golden State Warriors are taking another chance on a television analyst and former NBA guard who has never been a head coach at any level.

The Warriors won the bidding war with the New York Knicks for Steve Kerr on Wednesday, hiring him away from the TNT broadcast table to be their coach. Kerr agreed to a five-year, \$25 million deal with Golden State, said his agent, Mike Tannenbaum.

The Warriors confirmed the agreement Wednesday night and said they will introduce Kerr at a news conference after the contract is complete.

Kerr had been in talks with the Knicks about becoming their coach since Phil Jackson took over as team president in March. He won three titles playing for Jackson in Chicago and another two under Gregg Popovich in San Antonio.

Kerr, 48, also spent three seasons as general manager of the Phoenix Suns before stepping down in June 2010. He replaces Mark Jackson, who was fired by the Warriors on May 6 after three seasons and back-to-back playoff appearances mostly due to a sour relationship between him and team management.

Kerr said last month that he has wanted to coach since going

back to his job at TNT. And while the lure of building a contender with his mentor at Madison Square Garden looked appealing, the chance to coach a Western Conference contender in his home state proved to be too much.

The Warriors job is certainly a far more attractive one than when owner Joe Jacob hired Jackson away from the ESPN/ABC broadcast table in June 2011. The Warriors are coming off a 51-win season and consecutive playoff appearances for the first time in 20 years, and they've surrounded star Stephen Curry with a talented young core.

going in three."

A fourth event is a possibility for Sophie Noecker, as she was also a part of the Wildcats' runner-up 1600 relay (4:27.8). Wild cards for state — the five fastest non-winning relays from the 11 districts also qualify — will be announced later this week.

Savannah Scoville and Samantha Huss were a part of both the 400 and 1600 relays, and took home individual titles as well. Scoville won the 300 hurdles (51.5) and finished second in the 100 hurdles (16.6) to qualify for state in both events. Huss won the 400 (1:03.2).

Also for Hartington, Shelby Hochstein won the pole vault (8.0).

Wednesday's success is the culmination of a solid season of work, Coach Noecker noted.

"We asked them at the beginning of the season what they planned to do on the weekends, and they asked us what we want them to do," she said. "Champions don't take days off, and they proved today that they didn't."

The Wausa girls were led by senior Breana Gallup, who won the 1600 (5:47.2) and 3200 (12:12.8). She also placed second in the 800 (2:29.2) and helped the Vikings to a fourth place finish in the 1600 relay.

"I think I handled the pressure pretty well," said Gallup, who is headed to Doane for track and cross country this fall. "You just have to push hard and do what you can do."

Gallup, who has qualified in the 800, 1600 and 3200 all four years and has nine state meet medals to her credit, wants to add a medal she hasn't collected yet.

"I'm hoping to win the two-mile," she said. Gallup has earned top-five finishes in the 3200 all three years. "I'm going to have to push to get it."

Jenna Heine, Brittany Bruening and Courtney Arkfeld were a part of Wynot's 1600 (4:20.5) and 3200 (10:33.8) relay wins. Carissa Kuchta rounded out Wynot's 1600 relay, while Holly Lauer completed the Blue Devils' 3200 relay win.

Heine also won the high jump, clearing 5-0. Arkfeld won the 800 in 2:26.7.

The Hartington boys won eight of 17 events, with senior Pat Wortmann having a hand in four of them. He won the 400 (53.0), 800 (2:03.5) and 1600 (4:51.5), and anchored the Wildcats to victory in the 1600 relay (3:38.3).

Wortmann hoped to earn a spot in the fast heat of the

800 at state, and help the Wildcats do the same in the 1600 relay. He's hoping to see Hartington have another strong performance in Omaha.

"Hopefully we'll repeat what we did last year," he said.

Griffon Kalin was a part of Hartington's 400 (46.4) and 1600 relay wins, won the 300 hurdles (42.2) and placed third in the 100 (11.3). His long hurdle win was the start of a 1-2-3 Wildcat finish in that event, joined
