Pickstown, Watertown Create 125th Anniversary Committees

PIERRE — Pickstown and Watertown are the first communities to be designated official Statehood Celebration Communities. The two towns created local 125th Statehood Anniversary Committees to promote local and state history, hold celebration events and create a lasting legacy local project this year.

"I'm pleased Pickstown and Watertown responded so quickly and I hope other towns decide to participate in commemorating our anniversary as well," said Gov. Dennis Daugaard.

Next month, Pickstown will dedicate a new museum that will feature 2,000 exhibit objects and pictures, 400 wall exhibits and a theater where people can view old films of the town and the construction of the Fort Randall dam. Exhibits will also feature the early history of the area, the history of the local school and old books and newspaper articles.

But a few minutes after the historic victory, Meyer finally smiled — and thought of his wife.

"I haven't had this much fun since Carmen and I were married," he told the crowd of 6,654, standing on his right leg and leaning against the scorer's table as streamers and confetti drifted to the

floor. He was honored in July 2009 with ESPN's Jimmy V Perseverance Award, named for former North Carolina State coach Jimmy Valvano, who died in 1993 from cancer. Meyer also was given the John W. Bunn Lifetime Achievement Award from the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in August 2010.

Also among the veterans in attendance Saturday was Mike Neuroth of Valley Springs. Nicknamed "Captain Neutron," he was responsible for the "Dive the Boat" and "Surface the Boat" portions of the cere-

The San Diego native moved to South Dakota, where he graduated from Washington

High School in 1960. He then served in the U.S. Navy from 1961-68, where he served on the USS Perch and the USS Abraham Lincoln.

Asked about some of his strongest memories from his naval service, Neuroth said he was on the Perch during the Cuban Missile Crisis in 1962. The troop transport sub was on its way to the Panama Canal, but was called back before reaching the location. Neuroth jokes that fellow veterans who sailed through the canal still give him grief.

'We certainly didn't go anywhere that exciting," Neuroth said. He later made five patrols

north of the Arctic Circle. Also on his resume are 10 trips across the Atlantic

Ocean — eight by airplane and two by sub. "And guess which ones I

felt the safest on?," he asked, with a smile, referring to submarines.

As time passes and many submarine veterans - particularly those who served in World War II — pass away, events like Saturday become especially important, Black said.

"I'm very lucky to be around yet. I realize that," said Black, who turned 90 in January. "And I was one of the younger ones.

"It's good to be here and it's good to see a great crowd like this. I couldn't be happier.'


