# Pickstown, Watertown Create 125th Anniversary Committees

PIERRE — Pickstown and Watertown are the first communities to be designated official Statehood Celebration Communities. The two towns created local 125th Statehood Anniversary Committees to promote local and state history, hold celebration events and create a lasting legacy local project this year.

"I'm pleased Pickstown and Watertown responded so quickly and I hope other towns decide to participate in commemorating our anniversary as well," said Gov. Dennis Daugaard.

Next month, Pickstown will dedicate a new museum that will feature 2,000 exhibit objects and pictures, 400 wall exhibits and a theater where people can view old films of the town and the construction of the Fort Randall dam. Exhibits will also feature the early history of the area, the history of the local school and old books and newspaper articles.

Tom Brokaw, who lived in Pickstown for eight years, will be the keynote speaker at the dedication which is scheduled for 2 p.m. CDT on Friday, June 13. Lt. Gov. Matt Michels and Col. Joe Ross, commander of the Corps of Engineers Omaha District, will also speak at the ceremony. Other guests include Charles Pick and Frances Pick Dillard, relatives of General Lewis Pick.

Watertown's Statehood Celebration Community Committee is sponsoring seven hours of outdoor activities at Joy Ranch on Sunday, Aug. 17, featuring actors portraying South Dakota's first Governor, Arthur Mellette, and his wife, Margaret.

Activities and events will include a Sherwin Linton concert, games, costumes, butter churning, an old time hymn sing-a-long, old-time fiddlers, Native American dancers and cowboy shoot-

outs. A small electric train will also give rides throughout the grounds and there will also be displays of 1880s fire equipment. For their lasting legacy project, Watertown is creating a time capsule.

Last week, Gov. Daugaard sent over 500 information packets to South Dakota's cities, towns and local historical organizations to invite communities to commemorate South Dakota's 125th anniversary.

All locally formed committees will receive help from the Governor's Office to publicize their events and projects, an official certificate and the opportunity to have special highway signs for their communities.

friend or foe," Miles once said. "He would open up his play-book and show you his plays, and then he would turn around and beat you with that same play when your team played his."

Meyer kept coaching after being critically injured in traffic accident in September 2008. He was alone in a com-

panion car, leading a caravan of vehicles heading to an annual team retreat, when he collided head-on with a grain truck. Multiple operations followed to remove Meyer's spleen, repair cracked ribs and deal with a mangled left leg that had to be amputated below the knee.

He would later call the accident a blessing, because doctors also found cancer in his liver and small intestines.

Four months later — while coaching from a wheelchair — he became the winningest

men's basketball coach on Jan. 10, 2009. Yet always the humble teacher, Meyer noted during the postgame huddle defensive lapses on some 3-pointers.

"How selfish it would be if I was celebrating all this stuff and they were trying to be a better team," he said at the time.

But a few minutes after the historic victory, Meyer finally smiled — and thought of his wife.

"I haven't had this much fun since Carmen and I were

married," he told the crowd of 6,654, standing on his right leg and leaning against the scorer's table as streamers and confetti drifted to the floor.

He was honored in July 2009 with ESPN's Jimmy V Perseverance Award, named for former North Carolina State coach Jimmy Valvano, who died in 1993 from cancer. Meyer also was given the John W. Bunn Lifetime Achievement Award from the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in August 2010.

Saturday included a tolling of the bell for the 77 crew members of the *Scorpion* — which included Gregory's Jack Clough, the only South Dakotan on the sub. Following some closing marks, the group proceeded to Meridian Bridge where flowers were dropped in the river.

It was all to honor not only the *Scorpion*, but everyone who perished on submarine crews during World War II, Black said.

The history of the *Scorpion* is, by now, rather well known, thanks to the USSVI and the various *Scorpion* services held over the years in Yankton. En route to the East China and Yellow Seas on Jan. 5, 1944, for a fourth and final patrol, the *Scorpion* rendezvoused with the *USS Herring* to transfer an injured man. Heavy seas prevented a safe transfer, and the *Scorpion* was never seen or heard from again.

The only clue to the final location? "It was later discovered that enemy minefields had been strung across the entrance to the Yellow Sea," the memorial states.

During his brief remarks, Michels related situations where, while walking across the Meridian Bridge, he sees

young people stop and read the memorial.

"I'll even see people pick up their phones, and they'll start punching around," he said. "They'll pick up that great education tool called Wikipedia. And then they'll start talking and engaging in a conversation, and wondering why it's here."

Michels described the ways in which submarine veterans allowed Americans to live in a free society — he referenced current events in which people across the world are banished or punished for expressing views against a government.

"It's here because people gave their lives," Michels said of the *Scorpion* memorial. "This is a memory to them and their families, so we can visit them and honor them."

"This is a reflection of their final resting place, so that we can be free."

Also among the veterans in attendance Saturday was Mike Neuroth of Valley Springs. Nicknamed "Captain Neutron," he was responsible for the "Dive the Boat" and "Surface the Boat" portions of the ceremony — he carried a horn that blared to signify the beginning and end to the festivities.

"It's a good idea to have a memorial close to the ground like that so people can come look at it and read the names," Neuroth said during a post-ceremony lunch at the local VFW.

The San Diego native moved to South Dakota, where he graduated from Washington High School in 1960.

He then served in the U.S. Navy from 1961-68, where he served on the *USS Perch* and the *USS Abraham Lincoln*.

Asked about some of his strongest memories from his naval service, Neuroth said he was on the *Perch* during the Cuban Missile Crisis in 1962. The troop transport sub was on its way to the Panama Canal, but was called back before reaching the location. Neuroth jokes that fellow veterans who sailed through the canal still give him grief.

"We certainly didn't go anywhere that exciting," Neuroth said.

He later made five patrols north of the Arctic Circle. Also on his resume are 10 trips across the Atlantic

Ocean — eight by airplane and two by sub.

"And guess which ones I felt the safest on?" he asked, with a smile, referring to submarines.

As time passes and many submarine veterans — particularly those who served in World War II — pass away, events like Saturday become especially important, Black said.

"I'm very lucky to be around yet. I realize that," said Black, who turned 90 in January. "And I was one of the younger ones."

"It's good to be here and it's good to see a great crowd like this. I couldn't be happier."
