

Yankton will host the tournament with two top-tier courses just 1.3 miles apart, with a couple of restaurants in between and more within blocks of the path. Both Fox Run and Hillcrest have proven that they can step up to hosting big events, whether it is state tournaments, SDGA events or pro-ams.

I do understand the need to rotate tournament sites more in golf than nearly every other event. With the exception of The Masters, no major golf event is really in the same place every year, and for good reason. While home advantage in some sports is because of fan base, home advantage in golf means knowledge of a course that you're not going to get playing it once or twice, but by playing it on a regular basis.

Both Yankton courses provide their own unique challenges, and both have strong tournament pedigrees. Here's hoping the South Dakota High School Activities Association can make Yankton an even more regular destination for golfers.

"It's a community that never slows down, that enjoys the outdoors four seasons. And we're in a position to share what we already know with the rest of the world."

Minneapolis will surely take some cues from how Detroit and the New York area pulled it off.

The Motor City featured a 14-block festival called the Motown Winter Blast in 2006. The four-day party included dog sledding, ice sculptures, snowmobiling exhibitions, performances by Olympic figure skaters and a 200-foot long snow slide. A warmerthan-average January hampered some of the fun, though. Snow-making machines struggled with the slide and organizers had to put wheels on the dog sleds.

This year, organizers created a Super Bowl Boulevard that included Times Square, about 10 miles from the stadium in New Jersey. Partygoers could get their photo taken with the Vince Lombardi Trophy or zoom down a seven-story toboggan run, among other things. Some Broadway shows held a twoweek, two-for-one ticket promotion.

"We plan to set the bar high for all northern destinations that host the Super Bowl," vowed Doug Baker, a Minneapolis bid committee co-chair and CEO of St. Paulbased Ecolab.

Allen taxpayers approved a \$119 million bond issue that included funding r the 18,000-seat stadium, with a high-definition video board, a second decl

osed reforms by June 4. Crow said the decision by Pac-12 presidents to send the letter was unanimous and the initial feedback from university presidents has been positive.

The plan comes after Northwestern University football players cast secret ballots April 25 on whether to form the nation's first union for college athletes. The results of the vote will not be known for some time.

The full National Labor Relations Board has agreed to hear Northwestern's appeal of a regional director's March ruling that the players are university employees and thus can unionize. Ballots will remain impounded until that

Part of the idea behind the proposal by the Pac-12 presidents is to get ahead of the issue and meet some of the demands that have been raised by Northwestern players and other athletes without "professionalizing" college sports.

The letter states "it is clear from the recent statements of any number of individuals that, while they may share or view that labor unions are not the answer, the time has come for a meaningful response both to the student-athletes' grievances and the need to reassert the academic primacy of our mission.'

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
