

interned at the Cedar County (Nebraska) Extension Office, assisting with its 4-H program. "I really liked it and realized how much I had missed 4-H," Smolek said. "That was the point for me where I knew this was what I really want to do." Wanting to stay in the area but with no local 4-H positions available, Smolek accepted a position with *Northeast Nebraska News* as an ag reporter and editor of the *Randolph Times*. However, when Fosheim resigned, the Yankton position became available, and Smolek saw a chance to land her dream job. She applied for the position and was chosen as Fosheim's replacement. "I was so excited," she said. "I was counting down the days until I could start." As 4-H/youth development coordinator, Smolek will direct and assist with all 4-H programs and events in Yankton County. She will also be involved with the county's youth education programs that tie in agriculture with various STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) areas.

Iowa, Connecticut and Minnesota. The sixth couple was denied a marriage license Thursday, Newville said. Nancy Rosenbrahn, of Rapid City, married her long-time partner in April in Minneapolis and said it doesn't matter which state is first or last. "I think what matters is that we're all sending a message to either the Supreme Court or the legislators in Washington, D.C., that this has got to stop," she said Wednesday. The lawsuit, filed by Minneapolis attorney Josh Newville, claims three violations that are guaranteed in the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution: deprivation of equal protection, due process and right to travel. "The State will incur little to no burden in allowing same-sex couples to marry and in recognizing the lawful marriages of same-sex couples from other jurisdictions on the same terms as different-sex couples, while the hardship to Plaintiffs of being

"4-H is a lot more than just animals and farms," Smolek said. "There are so many things you can do. If a person has any kind of interest, it fits somewhere in 4-H." Since she is new to the position, Smolek said she will heavily utilize notes left behind by Fosheim, as well as the skills she learned from extension educator Jackie Steffen at the Cedar County office. Currently she is working on an animal science camp, a babysitting clinic and a nutrition program. Most of all, Smolek said she wants to stay as flexible as possible for the time being. "I want to find out what the county wants and needs for youth development programming, and then help fill that need for them," she said.

denied due process, equal protection, and privileges or immunities is severe, subjecting them to an irreparable denial of their constitutional rights," it states. The complaint seeks a declaration that the statute and constitutional bans are unconstitutional and asks that the defendants be prevented from enforcing the bans and be required to issue marriage licenses to same-sex couples and recognize gay marriages from other states. It also seeks reimbursement for lawyers and other costs. North Dakota voters in 2004 overwhelmingly passed a constitutional ban on same-sex marriage. Newville said several couples from North Dakota have contacted him about possibly representing them for a legal challenge in that state, which he's seriously considering. On Wednesday, Thompson, North Dakota, Mayor Karyn Hippen became the first in the state to join a national coalition of mayors who support same-sex marriage. Although 73 percent of the voters favored the constitutional ban, Hippen said she believes there's support in the state for the issue.

**Tuesday, May 23, 1989** • Yankton City Commission introduced Ordinance No. 612 which would prohibit an underage person from entering or remaining on the premises of establishments which derive more than 40 percent of their revenue from the sale of alcohol. • State officials are talking with Japanese business executives to determine whether South Dakota should set up a foreign trade zone to aid in importing and exporting goods, Gov. George Mickelson said Monday.

WALL ST. RECAP

Stocks finished higher Thursday, extending their modest gains from the day before. Investors drew encouragement from reports on Chinese manufacturing and the U.S. economy, as well as improving earnings from several U.S. retailers. Trading was lighter than usual as traders looked ahead to the Memorial Day weekend. **ON THURSDAY:** The Dow Jones industrial average rose 10.02 points, or less than 0.1 percent, to 16,543.08. The Standard & Poor's 500 index gained 4.46 points, or 0.2 percent, to 1,892.49. The Nasdaq composite added

22.80 points, or 0.6 percent, to 4,154.34. **FOR THE WEEK:** The Dow Jones industrial average is up 51.77 points, or 0.3 percent. The Standard & Poor's 500 index is up 14.63 points, or 0.8 percent. The Nasdaq composite is up 63.75 points, or 1.6 percent. **FOR THE YEAR:** The Dow is down 33.58 points, or 0.2 percent. The S&P 500 index is up 44.13 points, or 2.4 percent. The Nasdaq is down 22.25 points, or 0.5 percent.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly higher Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for July delivery fell 5 cents to \$6.5925 a bushel; July corn was 2.25 cents higher at 4.7675 a bushel; July oats were 5.50 cents higher at \$3.46 a bushel; while July soybeans advanced

13.50 cents to \$15.1875 a bushel. Beef and pork were lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle fell .95 cent to \$1.3865 a pound; August feeder cattle was 1.15 cents lower at \$1.9537 a pound; while July lean hogs fell 1.50 cents to \$1.2532 a pound.

Fitzgerald added that some of the contract language still needs to be worked out and the YEA needs to review the agreement with its membership, but he is confident the school board will vote on the contract at its next meeting on June 9. More specific details about the contract will be available once it is approved, he said.

According to YEA president Carol Larrington, the YEA will have a ratification meeting with members next week. She declined to comment further. Fitzgerald said he appreciated the effort made by the YEA negotiating committee. "It was a process, but we went through it, and we're glad that we came to an agreement so our school district can move forward," he said.
